

THE BEET SUGAR INDUSTRY IN CANADA

The production of sugar beets grown for beet sugar in Canada in 1924 according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics was 297,177
tons from 31,111 acres, an average
yield per acre of 9.50 tons, as compared with 159,200 tons from 17,
941 acres, or an average per acre of
8.87 tons in 1923. The total value
of the roots grown in 1924 was \$1,
704,791, as compared with \$1,922,
668 in 1923. The total production of
refined beetroot sugar in 1924 was
\$5,770,709 pounds of the value of
\$6,192,645. In 1923 the corresponding figures were 39,423,160 pounds,
of the value of \$3,745,200. During
1924 two Canadian sugar beetroot
factories were in operation. A third
factory has been established at Raymond, Alberta, and will operate for
the season 1925-26. The company reports that the acreage planted to
sugar beets for this season was well
over 6,000 acres and the total production is estimated at 58,000 tons,
an average yield per harvested acre
