Report of The Auditors of The Town of Bridgetown

GENTLEMEN:-

We, the auditors of the accounts of the Town of Bridgetown for the past twelve months ending on the 31st day of December, A. D. 1911, beg leave to submit the following report.

We have made a very careful and accurate examination of the Books of the Town Clerk and find them correct in every particular.

Every item of receipts and expenditure have been carefully checked. The deposits in the pass book of the Royal Bank of Canada correspond with ford, the items of cash deposited in the cash boook of the Town Clerk and with the total

sum of cash received. The proper amounts have been deposited to the credit of the various sinking funds, including the two new loans issued the past year, namely \$4000.00 for

permanent streets and \$1500,00 for water. We note that during the year the sum of five hundred dollars has been deposited to the credit of the sinking fund account for schools whereas the yearly deposit required is only two hundred and fifty dollars. This increased deposit was necessary on account of this sinking fund being in arrears. Also seventy-five dollars was deposited during the past year additional to the credit of the sinking fund

for the Carleton's Corner extension for the same reason. We also note that the town treasurer has paid the past year to the Royal Bank of Canada the sum of one thousand dollars to retire debentures due on the Engine house as will appear by the Debenture sheet annexed hereto, and that the sinking fund in this account only amounted to the sum of \$499.26, leaving a bal-

ance to be taken out of current account of \$500.74. Notwithstanding this unprovided for expenditure of \$500,74, the overdraft in the Royal Bank on the 31st day December last, was only \$277.03 and there was

eash in the treasury amounting to the sum of \$214.90. It will be of interest to the rate-payers to know that the uncollected taxes due to date only amount to the sum of \$238,07 and that there is only one delinquent carried forward from the year 1910 and a judgement is held for that.

We append a statement of uncollected taxes. It will also be of interest to the rate-payers to learn that during the past year days last week with friends at Nicthe Council were able to secure much better and more favorable terms with the taux and Torbrook. Royal Bank of Canada who have now the town account.

This matter was discussed in Council, and it was the opinion that better terms should be asked for, from both Banks.

The matter was left with the Finance Committee, and they asked both local banks to submit written tenders for the town account.

When the tenders were opened by the Council it was found that the tender of the Royal Bank was a little better than that of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and that both tenders were much more favorable than before.

We find upon examining the ledger account that the sum of \$934.00 was expended by the street committee in the purchase of stone last summer and we are informed by the street committee that there is still on hand, stone valued approximately at the sum of \$616.00.

FROM THE MAYOR TO THE EDITOR OF THE MONITOR:-

I am enclosing you herewith the financial statement of the town for the past twelve months ending December 31st 1911, with the auditors' report.

In addition to this statement I wish to add that the appropriation for streets included in the town estimates for 1911 was \$600.00 and out of this sum the street committee have only spent about the sum of \$150.00 thus leaving a balance of about \$450,00 on hand to be added to the balance on hand on permanent street account which by the enclosed report amounts to the sum of \$170.75 thus making a total of \$620.75 on hand to be used in 1912, together with stone on hand valued in the report at \$616.00.

I would also call the attention of the rate-payers to the fact that an expenditure of about \$377.00 was incurred last year in extending water service with hydrant to the factory of Salter and Graves which will also appear in the report, and this expenditure was not in the estimates for 1911 and was not provided for.

It will be also noticed by the report that there was a payment out of current account of \$500.74 to retire Debentures which matured during the year on the Engine house, as the sinking fund was not sufficient. If these two items of expenditure had not been incurred, and they were unprovided for, there would be a substantial balance in the Bank instead of a small overdraft, together with the amount of cash on hand at the end of the year.

In reference to the communication in your issue of the 24th instant, signed by "Elector" in which he refers to me in an ungentlemanly manner I have only to say, I have always absolutely refused to answer correspondence of this nature, as I think a person who is afraid to disclose his identity in asking information is unworthy of notice.

I submit that the enclosed financial statement will convince any intelligent and unbiased rate-payer, "Elector" to the contrary notwithstanding, that the financial affairs of the town are in a very satisfactory condition, during my term of office, and that they will compare very favorably with any other year since incorporation.
