A REMARKABLE PETITION.—A porthion from Mysore was received a short time ago, in England, addressed, "To all the socioies of wise gentlemen in England," asking that a school may be established there, in which the linguish language may be rought. Three Chousand three hundied and ferty names were approdud to this putition, in right languages. Mysere is not nominally under thritish rule; those who petition are Ifindoes and Museulmen; they polition in behalf of all the inhabitants of the city; the petition is forwarded by a missionary, and they understand well that, if a school shall be established, it will be conflucted on Christian principles. What a change, it shows, is taking place in the feelings of the people of India in respect both to education and to Christiantiff

A Missionary Mesting is New Zhaland.—At a infesionary meeting in New Zealand held in the open air, on account of the numbers present, very many were provided with good and capacions tents, and all were remarkably well dressed in Empean contume. Twelve native teachers and three chiefs addressed the addlence, and a collection was taken amounting to about \$240. One individual propert proposed that these meetings be discontinued, but the people, on its being referred to them, exclaimed with a heavy voice, No, never. When we give up our missionary collections, we shall have renounced Christianity.

Mission Pares in Gerron, ... flince the Reablishment of the press in the mission of the Board in Ceylon, upwards of one hundred and sixtyois millions of pages have been printed.

A CHINESE ASMANAC.—An Almanao has been issued by the insur-gents in China, in which the year is divided into weeks, and each Sab-bath is duly marked as a day of worship. The distinction of licky days, and the calculation of dentity with which Chinese works of this kind are filled, are rejected from it on the ground that "times and scarofis are at the disposal of our Heavenly Patter, and he wite plously performs his duty will at all times enjoy the divine protection."

LEANG Ara. Leang Afa, the first Chinese convert, is still actively engaged in the service of his Master. He is, says one who recently heard him, very carnest and happy when addressing his countrymen on the subject of the great salvation.

THE NEW TESTABERT FOR CHINA .- The British and Foreign Bible Society has resolved to print, with the least possible delay, a million copies of the New Testament for circulation in Clina.

A REINFORCEMENT FOR CHIVA-The London Missionary Society is making streamoun efforts to add at least ten new labourers to the present number of its missionaries in China.

CONGREGATIONALISM IN NEW ENGLAND .- In the New England States there are 1,378 Congregational churches, 1,530 ministers, and 164,600 members; 3,694 were added the past year.
