FIRES

The stove mill at Castleford, Ont., owned by the Sutherland-Innes Company, of Chatham, Ont., was burned a few days ago.

A portable saw mill and about 500,000 feet of lumber belonging to J. I. Black & Sons, of Sackville, N.B., were burned at Aboushagan recently. The loss is about \$5,000.

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS ONTARIO.

Reports from the Ottawa valley and Georgian Bay districts state that there has not been the usual mid-summer falling off in the demand for white pine, but that orders have continued to be placed in goodly volume. The activity in building in Ottawa and vicinity is chiefly accountable for the increased demand in that section, while the Georgian Bay mills are shipping largely to Michigan. There has been some scurrying around for dry cutting-up grades, which are in short supply. Sales of this stock are being made at Georgian Bay points at \$25, and stock boards at \$14 to \$16. Hemlock is very strong and brings from \$12 to \$14 at the mill, while there is good buying of all kinds of shingles. No. 1 cedars are held by manufacturers at \$2.50, and No. 2 cedar lath at \$2.00. No. 1 pine lath ranges from \$2.25 to \$2.50 at the mill. Hardwoods are held firmly, but have not materially improved in demand. Basswood is the exception and finds a buyer very readily. One manufacturer reports the sale of 50,000 feet, log run, at \$15.50. In Toronto trade is quiet. Some dealers state that prices are weaker and that purchases of lumber can be made at a reduction from the spring quotations. British Columbia red cedar shingles were recently advanced in price in Toronto, which advance has been sustained.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

The volume of building in Montreal this year has been small, and the retail demand for lumber necessarily limited. Export trade is also dull compared with this time last year, especially in spruce, and the opinion is expressed that the price of this lumber is likely to decline somewhat. Hardwood prices in Montreal are holding their own, but the demand is limited. Manufacturers of spruce in New Brunswick hope that the worst has now been passed, and that the market will improve in the fall. They recognize the necessity, however, of limiting their operations in the woods next winter. New Brunswick cedar shingles are very steady at \$2.90 for extras, on Boston rate of freight.

MANITOBA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Dealers announce an encouraging improvement in the demand for lumber. Trade in Winnipeg has been brisk all season as a result of large building

operations. Permits have been issued this year for buildings aggregating in value nearly \$1,200,000. The immense grain crop is also a strong factor in the situation, and a very heavy demand for lumber is looked for in the fall. In British Columbia trade is fair and will be assisted by the improvement in Manitoba and the Territories.

The dealers in Winnipeg last week advanced the price of shingles 15 cents per thousand, and there is a prospect of another advance of 10 cents. They are scarce and in good demand.

UNITED STATES

There have been no signs during the past week that the white pine market of the United States was weakening. The demand from retailers throughout the corn belt where the drought has damaged the crops has fallen off, but this has been offset by an increased trade in the Eastern States. In the Lake Superior district the conditions are very favorable. There is activity in the demand for No. 4 boards, which have been sluggish for some time. Norway pine is likewise strong, with some grades bringing higher prices. Heavy shipments are being made to the east. Of twenty-three steamers which left Duluth last week loaded with lumber, sixteen were destined for Buffalo and Tonawanda. In the Saginaw valley white pine continues remarkably strong for this time of year, while hemlock is moving better than could be expected. From Cleveland comes the report that little Norway lumber has been received in the past two weeks, and there is a noticeable shortage of this in many sizes and lengths. There is still a shortage in the supply of good lumber held at Buffalo and Tonawanda, where prices have advanced slightly in sympathy with the strong position at the head of the lakes. Our Bay City and Saginaw price list this week shows a slight advance in the price of the thinner sizes of uppers, common, and shaky clear. The price of ash and birch at Buffalo has also been advanced about one dollar per thousand. Hardwoods generally are quiet, but steady. It is reported that elm is a trifle weaker. Eastern spruce is firm owing to the exceedingly limited supply rather than any buoyancy in demand. Clapboards are selling in Boston at \$30 to \$32 for extra spruce and \$28 to \$30 for clear. Shingles of all grades are strong. The supply of
