Dr. Sims has tried this now extract of Pinus Canadonsis for about eight mouths in some affections of the rectum, vagina, and corrix nori, he has used it, considerbly diluted, as a vaginal wash, with great success, but profers to apply it to the os tines on cotton wool, either pure or mixed with giveerine, or glyceniand rose water. Thus applied, it should remain intent for two or three, or even four days, and then be renewed. In this way he has seen chronic granular vaginitis that had resisted the ordinary remedies for weeks; and granular erosions, with lon-corrhex, disappear very rapidly.—The Doctor.

PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATIONS. - The following were the questions in Surgical Anatomy and the Principles and Practice of Surgery submitted to the candidates for the diploma of Membership of the Royal College of Surgeons, London, at the last examination. 1. Describe the inguinal canal, its boundaries and relations to other structures, including heroial protrusions. 2. What are the causes and the immediate and remote consequences of sudden extravasation of urino? What treatment would you adopt in such a case? 3. Give the pathology of non-traumatic ancurism, from its commencement to its termination. 4. Describe the operation known as Chopart's, and the relative position of the various parts out through in this amputation. 5. How are scirrhus and medullary cancor distinguished in the fiving subject? What organs does each form specially affect, and at what ages do they respectfully occur? 6. By what form of accident is discolation of the head of the former backward usuatty caused? Describe the two discolations in this direction, the deformity existing in each, and the proper method of reducing them. The following were the questions on the Principles and Practice of Medicine, viz. 1. Describe a case of tuborcular meningitis in a child, from the appearance of promonitory symptoms to the termination in death. 2. Give the symptoms of diabetes mellitus, with the methods of analyzing the urino; also, the treatmont by medicines and diet. 3. Write a prescription in full for homoptysis, gastrodynia, and dysentery, also, a prescription for an aperient draught and a sleeping draught. There were fiftyfour candidates, of which number five were rejected on the first day, and twelve on the second.
