It hath been sufficiently remarked, as we have travelled through this extensive country, that it every where abounds with fish, fowl, and variety of game, that in its forests are most kinds of useful timber, and a variety of wild fruit; and, no doubt, every kind of European fruit might be cultivated and raised here in great perfection. In a word, this country wants nothing but that culture and improvement, which can only be the effect of time and industry, to render it equal, if not superior, to any in the world.
