We think the worst news in regard to Cuba has come out and had its effect upon the market. Mr. Havemeyer's illness has been regarded as a serious menace to the future of Sugar Trust, and has had some influence in depressing that stock, but we hear his condition is better, and no serious result is expected. While there is no particularly good buying to benefit the market, we think short interest is large, and that the market ought to get a rally of several points during the week on covering of this interest.


