


It is known that the packers in the event of losing in the privy council will turn further appeals into diplomatic channels, with an internationa commission as a possible court of final appeal

Admiralty Report E-Seven Missing Since Fourth of

The E-7 was a 1912 boat, 725 tons displacement (afloat) with a speed of 16 knots above water. She carried four torpedo tubes.
