PENETANGUISHENE HOTEL.

The location of the Penetanguishene is most attractive. It stands in a pretty natural park of about 30 acres, at an altitude of 577 feet above sea level and 337 feet above Lake Ontario. In front of the hotel is a good sandy bathing beach. From the extensive verandahs, balconies and windows of the hotel a grand view is presented of the harbor, 5 miles in length, and the Georgian Bay beyond, with its matchless and varied scenery, the gateway to the 30,000 Islands. This is the starting point for the journey through the inside channel to Parry Sound by the Northern Navigation Co.'s
