## GUESSING DATE FOR THE OLYMPIC GAMES

Not Before the Year After  
Next—Countries Not Ready  
for the Meet.

London, March 24.—It looks as tho another hoax has been planned in the matter of the Olympic games. One day it is announced that they are to be held in Antwerp in 1920 and the next the venue is just as suddenly transferred to Rome. One wonders who is responsible for the launching of these reports which

America was to have promoted the games of 1916, which, if the war had not intervened, would have taken place in Berlin. Still more fantastic was the statement in 1917 that the 1920 Olympic was to be held at Lyons, where German

prisoners were reported to be already engaged in building a huge stadium and preparing the track. Now it is Antwerp—or Rome. The probability is that there will be no gathering of the world's athletes in 1920.

The English athletic authorities have not even been approached, or consulted in any way, as to the possibility of the games being held in England.

Games being revived in 1920. France and Belgium are not ready for such a meet, and none of the Dominions has suggested that they desire such a speedy resumption. England does not hold Olympiads in great favor. They make too big a call on the specialist in sport. They do not fit in with our idea of the "game for the game's sake."
