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PARING DOWN ESTIMATES.

LARGE REDUCTION IN THE WORKS DEPARTMENT. Slight Excess Over Last Year's Total—Bridges and Intersecting Sewer Crossed Out—Five-Cent Island Ferry Proposed Will be Tried—Another Power Franchise Asked for—Discussing Civic Legislation.

The Board of Works spent the greater part of yesterday afternoon chopping Mr. Keating's estimates. The result was a reduction of \$250,000. This makes the total \$378,496. Last year the appropriation was \$388,750.

Another Franchise Wanted. A letter was read from Mr. Joseph Barrett offering to sell light, heat and power to the people of Toronto and provide a sub-committee of the Executive Council to lay the necessary wires. Referred to the Aqueduct Committee.

The sub-committee appointed to deal with the ferry question yesterday decided to advertise for a company that will give a 5-cent return fare to the Island, in consideration of receiving free wharfage on both sides.

Messrs. Thomas Crawford, M.L.A., and George F. Marter, M.L.A., yesterday met a sub-committee of the Executive Council to discuss the proposed legislation that the city is asking for, Messrs. Crawford and Howland were not present.

Mr. Crawford is opposed to the abolition of property qualifications for aldermen, and Mr. Marter favors it. Both members approve of the two years' term for aldermen and the setting aside of certain streets for speeding purposes.

The Property Committee and the Manufacturers' Committee will meet to-day. In the Police Court yesterday E. A. Keating, ex-convict, was charged by Deputy Clerk Kennedy with having committed a breach of the game law by exposing wild ducks for sale during the season. Keating, who is a hardware merchant, provided hunters with ammunition and the ducks for sale, sending numbers of ducks to his place in the city and was fined \$5 and costs.

Richard Bowker was again in court on a charge of stealing \$1,000 from the Toronto Police. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$5 and costs. The Verbal conspiracy case was further adjourned till next week on request of counsel for the defence.
