Quebec, Aug. 14.—Rev. Fathers Goyer and Lacoste, who have Just returned from the Canadian Labrador, say that the Indians are suffering severely from lack of sufficient food. There is general complaint scainst Newfoundlanders, who are destroying the eggs of the birds, which should be a source of revenue to them. The missionaries complain of the outrageous abuse on the part of traders who deal out whisky to the Indians with most deprable effects. This abuse has given rise to a serious loss of life, and is spreading poverty, disease and misery throughout the Labrador peninsula. Diseases, such as pneumonia, consumption, etc., are rapidly increasing among the poor Indians, who are fast dying out.


