Searching was resumed again to-day with the finding of their hats and a pair of oars floating in the bay, which shows they were drowned. Cole was a married man with two children. Morden was a young man and unmarried. Efforts are being made to find their bodies.

THE STATE OF TRADE.

The Holiday and Bad Condition of Country Roads Have Restricted Trade—Activity in Grain Circles.

Dun & Co. say: The holiday has interfered somewhat with the movement of merchandise at Toronto this week. A large number of travelers returned from their trips on Wednesday, and the volume of business consequently was curtailed. Country roads, too, are breaking up, and the movement of produce has not been as large as usual. City trade, however, has been fairly active, and the outlook continues satisfactory. Prices are firm all around. The grocery trade has been good, with an active demand for sugars, dried fruits and tins. Grain and flour have advanced 1-10c. There has also been a good demand for fancy goods, notions, etc., while orders were satisfactory for heavy dry goods. Other lines, such as hardware, leather, boots and shoes, etc., have been moderately active. A large export trade in grain continues to be done, with prices of wheat, flour and oats higher than a week ago. It is most satisfactory to note that the grain market in New York is not as large as in Ontario for many years. Occasionally there have been dull days, but a recession of the market will almost invariably create a buyer. The stock of wheat is diminishing and the surplus remaining in the country seems relatively better than in the city, and small sorters orders are still coming in fair number. It is gratifying to learn that woolen manufacturing interests are showing some improvement in orders and rather more disposed to buy raw stock, of which supplies are momentarily limited on spot, but a cargo of Cape wool for this market from New York is not expected. The failures in this district are very few, and collections as a whole are very fair; from the west they are generally good, but there are some districts in this province where sales of hay and straw have been light, owing to low prices, etc., and where money does not seem to be over plentiful.

Mrs. John McFarlane, Aged 74, Became Exhausted and Lay Down and Died.

Winnipeg, Nov. 26.—The dead body of Mrs. John McFarlane of Township L, Range 13, was found on the prairie yesterday. It appears that Mrs. McFarlane left her two weeks ago to visit a neighbor, and the family felt assured she was staying there. To-day it was found that she had never reached her neighbor's house, and a search was made, resulting as above. Deceased was 74 years of age. It is supposed that she became exhausted and simply lay down and died.

THE HUMANITY SOCIETY.

The regular monthly meeting of the Humanity Society was held yesterday afternoon with the president, J. J. Kelso, in the chair. Inspector Chapman reported seven convictions during the month. Two were for drivers' cruelty while driving cattle to the West End market, two for cruelty to horses. The main question before the society was the petition to be presented to the Legislature next week to prevent the hunting of rabbits with ferrets. Petitions are being sent in from all over the country, largely signed. That from Toronto has been signed by the Mayor and aldermen with the exception of two.

Mr. Craig Again Nominated.

Fergus, Ont., Nov. 26.—The Reformers of East Fergus met yesterday to-day in convention for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the approaching election for the Local House. The names brought before the convention were: John Craig of Fergus, the present member; James Kirkwood of Erin Township; William Cushing of Arthur Township. The second ballot resulted: Craig 68, Kirkwood 22. Mr. Craig's nomination was made unanimous.

Swine Plague in Essex.


Windsor, Ont., Nov. 26.—Dr. Perkins, Government Veterinary Inspector, had over 500 hogs slaughtered in the southern part of Essex County last week and has placed a number of farms under quarantine for swine plague.
