PLEASED WITH BRITAIN'S SUCCESS. Notwithstanding all the talk of American expansion the territory of the United States is as yet not a bit bigger than it was six months ago, but the territory in the Pacific over which Great Britain holds sway has been twice enlarged in that time, first by securing control of Wei Hai Wei, and then by the "leasing" of two hundred square miles of the mainland opposite Hong Kong.

The British Empire grows bigger almost every year, but probably never before in the history of its expansion has the addition of another bit of land to the territory over which the old flag waves been greeted with pleasure by any foreign people. Now American newspapers are congratulating Great Britain on her success in China. The New York Tribune, referring to the raising of the British flag over the heights of Kowloon, opposite Hong Kong, says: "That means that all menace to the peace of the Pacific is at an end. The British flag is supreme on each of the three great rivers. If that is not a Roland for the Olivers of Manchuria and Kiaochow, one wonders what to reckon it. The fact is, Great Britain is holding her own and something more at every point. Her prospects may not always make as much noise and show as more demonstrative peoples, but they have the old Anglo-Saxon habit of 'seeing their own' in the map of the world, and wherever it spreads its sticks. That is true in Africa, from Cape to Delta. That is true in Asia, and in the islands of the sea."

If the good feeling continues to grow we may yet hear the Americans rejoicing over the rapid development of Canada and applauding its determination to remain a part of the British Empire.

**REMOVE THE HANDICAP.** The closing of the canals on Sunday is a very serious handicap to the business interests of this country. The custom has been largely responsible for the failure of the St. Lawrence route to attract its fair share of the export traffic. The closing of the canals on Sunday means more than the loss of one day each week. When the vessels and barges are allowed to accumulate Sunday, the congestion becomes so great that many of them cannot be released till late Monday. Between one and a half and two days per week is the average time lost by reason of this unfair regulation. The Erie Canal is open all Sunday, and this fact accounts to a considerable degree for the great amount of business that is done via Buffalo in comparison with that of the St. Lawrence route. SUNDAY CARS TO NIMICO. Judge McDougall's Decision Given Out Yesterday.

Important Ruling in the Case Against the Mimico Electric Railway Company—The Indictment is Quashed—Cars May Now Run—Text of the Judgment.

Judge McDougall yesterday morning handed out judgment granting the motion to quash the indictment preferred at the December Sessions, 1897, against the Toronto and Mimico Electric Railway Company, charging the latter with running their cars on Sunday contrary to 60 Victoria, cap. 14, sec. 2, and sec. 138 of the Criminal Code. Mr. Dewar, County Crown Attorney, Mr. O'Meara, representing the Lord's Day Alliance, and Mr. G. H. Ritchie, counsel for the company, were present.

His Honor said in a motion to quash an indictment preferred against the Toronto and Mimico Electric Railway Company, charging the latter with running their cars on Sunday contrary to 60 Victoria, cap. 14, sec. 2, and sec. 138 of the Criminal Code. The indictment was set out in the indictment as follows: "That the defendants, the Toronto and Mimico Electric Railway Company, in the County of York, on June 2, 1897, being the Lord's Day, did unlawfully and wilfully run their cars on Sunday, contrary to 60 Victoria, cap. 14, sec. 2, and sec. 138 of the Criminal Code."

YESTERDAY'S BANK MEETINGS. No less than six Canadian banks held their annual meetings of shareholders yesterday—the Merchants' Bank of Canada, Montreal, the Union Bank of Canada in Quebec, and the Toronto, Standard and Imperial in Toronto. A full report of the proceedings of the Merchants' Bank meeting will appear in tomorrow's World.

The exhibit presented by the Bank of Toronto showed that the net profits of the bank for the year amounted to \$210,559.81, out of which "two" half-yearly dividends of 5 per cent. each were paid and \$100,347.01 carried forward to next year. The President in his report alluded to the improvement in many departments of trade and the excellent prospects for increasing activity in business.

The report of the Standard Bank showed that business during the year had made some improvement, notwithstanding the great accumulation of funds during a portion of the year, for which there was no safe outlet. The net earnings of the Standard amounted to \$115,157.35, which enabled them to pay two half-yearly dividends of 4 per cent. each and to carry over \$30,000 to profit and loss account.

The report presented by the Directors of the Imperial Bank showed that the profits for the year footed up to \$281,383.92. Two half-yearly dividends of 4 per cent. each were paid, besides a bonus of 1 per cent. and \$43,200 carried to the reserve fund. President Howland in the course of his address alluded to the widening area of the bank's business and the consequent increase in the number of branches in different parts of the country. Allusion was also made to the fact that the bank had been successful in obtaining the franchise for the construction of the Alaska and the Northwest Territories.

**Priority of Loan Affairs.** The priority of mortgage debenture holders of the Farmers' Loan Company was again argued before the Master-in-Ordinary yesterday. This time it was a question of costs. The Master-in-Ordinary decided that the debenture holders were entitled to priority in the liquidation of the company, and that the costs of the proceedings should be paid by the company.
