TORONTO SWIMMING CLUB.

Echoes of the Trip to St. Louis—Canadian Game the Best.

A LATER ACCOUNT

The Sky Was Blue, the Water Rippled and There Were Many Thousands of Spectators.

New York, Sept. 29.—The Roman conqueror returned to his triumph of barbaric splendor. No victorious king or prince received such a magnificent ovation as over-whelmed Admiral Dewey today, as he stood on the bridge of the Olympia at the head of a magnificent fleet of steel gunboats.

The sky was blue, the water rippled and the fresh wind that held the flags straight and taut, and the wharves and piers black with frantic, enthusiastic people, who strove weakly to make their shouts heard above the perfect bedlam of metal, ashore and afloat.

Nothing Like It Before. New York has never witnessed before anything so wonderful, so remarkable, so marvellous a demonstration. The Columbia naval parade, the dedication of Grant's tomb and the reception of the North Atlantic squadron last fall all pale before this single morning destroyed in many a heart without the loss of a man or ship.

It is not beyond the limit to say that three million people viewed the pageant that afternoon, and that a quarter of a million were deaf.

People who went down the bay were lost in admiration of the hunting along the water front. On the East River, from the bridge to the Battery, where the sailing craft lie in groves, the spars were covered with such a mass of colors as might be compared to a maple-grown hillside in the deep autumn. The tall spars of the clipper were conspicuous for their castles and signals. Every craft in the harbor was decked out from stem to stern with all the gaud and attractiveness known to skippers.
