

THE DOMINION ALLIANCE SHUT OUT OF THE CASE

Prohibitory Law in Manitoba, Its Constitutionality, and How the Hudson Bay Company Stands in Regard to It.

Winnipeg, Nov. 28.—(Special).—The Liquor Act test case came before the full court to-day. Justices Killam, Richards and Dubuc were on the bench. Attorney-General Campbell attended on behalf of the Pro-

vincial Government, and introduced the case to the court. There were also present F. H. Phlippen, representing the liquor license holders; Perdue, representing the Hudson Bay Co., and Mulock and Taylor,

Mr. Campbell announced that he had received formal notice from the Minister of Justice that the Dominion Government would not be represented. He and Mr. Judge Killam: "I do not see how a

Alkins would represent the Provincial Government throughout the case. Mr. Perdue stated that he appeared only to inform the court of the decision of the Hudson Bay Co. not to appear in the case by counsel.

In introducing the case Mr. Campbell drew the attention of the court to the

consideration of two points: First, as to the claim of the Hudson Bay Co., that they need not be represented by counsel; and secondly, as to the power of the Local Government in passing the Liquor Act. The constitutionality of the Act was the main point

at issue. He proceeded to give a resume of the Government's action in the matter since the framing of the Act until the present, when the decision was arrived at to submit the Act to the court.

Difficulty With the H. B. Co.

The difficulty was that the Hudson Bay Co. would not consent to argue the case. By the B.N.A. Act the local Government had the power to legislate on the liquor traffic, and by the Imperial Act the company claimed that all their trading rights, and consequently all their property, were derived from the Imperial Government, and that they were entitled to be represented by Your Lordships that the local Government is most anxious to have these gentlemen appear in the argument."
