Favor Alien Labor Law Against All Countries

Strong Measure to Be Fought Through Dominion Parliament to Aid Canadian Mechanics.

Ottawa, April 5.—(World Special Correspondent.)—Twenty-five representatives of trades unions from the Atlantic to the Pacific will wait upon the cabinet to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock to press on the government the desirability of advocating their proposed new alien labor law, which aims to restrict all imported contract labor from only the United States, but also from every other foreign country. A. W. Patten, M.P. (Winnipeg), will introduce the legislation to the Premier; Sir William Mulock and Hon. Mr. Blair will receive it.

St. Louis, Mo., April 5.—After four months of controversy between the employes of the Wabash Road and the officials of that system, during which a strike was imminent and was prevented only by an injunction restraining the employes from vacating their positions, and which injunction was dissolved last Wednesday, the differences were finally adjusted and the controversy effectually and satisfactorily settled to-night.

WHERE FOOLS RUN 'EM

St. Louis, Mo., April 5.—Four indictments were returned yesterday by the grand jury against John J. Ryan, president of the John J. Ryan Investment Company, which recently failed, charging him with embezzlement as follows: Two other indictments on the same charge were returned against Ryan and Oscar B. Fisher in his report, the grand jury refers in scathing terms to the "get-rich-quick" concerns, and calls attention to the fact that action by the authorities against them was impossible until money had actually been lost through various yardmen receiving a substantial increase, varying in different localities.
