FREE SPEECH TRIUMPH.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Nov. 13.—Moore Bayles, chairman of the Cecil Churchill meeting, says: "The meeting was a striking triumph for free speech. It was essential that the Birmingham public should have the opportunity of hearing the Unionist views, adverse to the undiluted protection advocated by Mr. Chamberlain. I am as great a Tory as ever, and my free trade instincts have been hardened like steel by the fire thru which they have passed."

JUST POSTPONED.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Nov. 13.—The Daily Standard, referring to Premier Balfour's statement in his letter to Gibson Bowles that the scheme of levying duties on food stuffs was impracticable at present, asks: "Why not drop it at once? It gives the suspicion to a condemned project that it is not rejected, but postponed until a more convenient season."

GREAT INTEREST AROUSED.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Nov. 13.—The greatest interest has been aroused in Bristol by the Colston anniversary celebration today. Premier Balfour, the chief speaker at the Dolphin banquet, arrived from London yesterday at Bedminster, where he is the guest of the Duke of Beaufort. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach will also speak.

Barely Missed the Magazine.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 12.—A fire broke out on the torpedo destroyer Lawrence to-night, which barely missed the magazine. The boat was moored in the midst of a torpedo boat flotilla. Lieut. Curtis and five seamen were overcome in an heroic fight against the flames.

DISPARAGING GOLDWIN SMITH.

The London Post Endorses the Opinions of Alderman Sheppard.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Nov. 13.—The Post makes an onslaught on Goldwin Smith in a recent article on Canada, the empire and Chamberlain, and says: "It is well worth studying, if only because a more amazing tissue of misrepresentation was never put together by an inhabitant of a British dependency. The separations of provinces are only half truths, for every Canadian knows that more traffic passes thru the Soo in one year than thru the Suez Canal, and the prairie and the coast are full of prosperous mining towns. It is pitiful to think of a life-long student of the world's history bringing himself to regard the empire as a fortuitous course of atoms. It is impossible to spend a day on Canadian soil without becoming conscious that all parties in Canada regard Chamberlain as the statesman for the age. Still Goldwin Smith would have us believe that Chamberlain would favor the renewal of commercial reciprocity with the United States. The free traders of England refuse to see that Canadian Liberals, having under their eyes the example of American prosperity, have long since abandoned their belief in the dogmas of the Cobden Club. That Goldwin Smith is with them they may regard as a good omen, but he is always on the losing side."
