Retired Presbyterian Clergyman Passed Away Today.

James Mc-Caul, retired Presbyterian Clergyman, and formerly pastor of the Church of the Covenant in this city, died yesterday morning at 10 o'clock at his home suported, and towards noon became Metropolitan at Moore Park.
