Toronto has plenty of material for a professional hockey team right now. But how will it be when the frost is off the pumpkin and the ice is on the rink. With the present rink accommodation it is admitted there is no money in professional hockey in Toronto. But there is a big outside demand for hockey material. What will the result be? Simply that the professional leagues which have the gates will pick over the Toronto bunch and what is left won't be good enough to make a visiting team warm up. Can't you see the finish from where you sit?

In reply to all inquiries as to the class of hockey that the Forest City will have this winter we can only say: "We do not."

Poor old Blufftown! She only captured two O. R. F. U. championships, and can only possibly win two Dominion titles. Verily she is to be sympathized with.

There appears to be some question as to whether the Tigers will have an opportunity of winning a clear title to the Canadian championship or not. The victory of McGill over Varsity rather complicates matters intercollegiate. McGill at present has won the greatest number of games in the college series, but there are a few kicks registered at headquarters which must needs be disposed of before there can be a championship battle played. If the protests against Varsity are allowed, and the disputed games won from Queen's are awarded to the latter team, McGill and Queen's will be tied for honors. McGill won't play off with the Tigers in the event of being awarded the leadership, because the students of that school claim that it is too close to the holidays to bother with Rugby. Virtually, the Striped Ones are the 1936 champions of the Dominion, and must be recognized as such, even if McGill does get an attack of lead tribby.

The local branch of the Y. M. C. A. is going in for basketball this season with a vengeance. At present there are about eighteen teams playing in the gym in turn.

FAMILIES FAMOUS IN BASEBALL GAME

Deleahants, the Clarksons and the Gansels were the Best of Them.

An exchange says: Baseball runs in families, sometimes. There were the Madden brothers, famous in Massachusetts thirty years ago. There were just nine of them and they were a fine team. Mike Madden was the only one of the family who became a professional. He was a third baseman and played with the old Syracuse Stars, which was the first semi-professional team to defeat a National League nine. They beat the Boston 2 to 0 in 1876.

The Mansell brothers—Mike, Tom, and Joe—were well known professional players in their day. They came from New York State, near Syracuse. Mike was third baseman for the old Mets in 1892. Tom was with the Kansas City team for several years.

Mike and Jerry Dorgan were two brothers, who became famous as professional ball players. Both played with the New York team. Mike as change catcher and right fielder of the Giants in 1893-94, and Jerry as a catcher for the Mets at one time.

The Deleahant family of Cleveland has turned out ball players, five of whom are on the major league today. The Yankees' left fielder is the most prominent member of the family now. "Big Ed" was the most noted of the brothers. He was one of the heaviest batters who ever swung a bat and met his death only a few years ago.

The Gansels of Kalamazoo, Mich., have also produced three well-known players in Charley, John and Joe. The latter, like John, being a third baseman. John is to captain the Cincinnati Reds next season. Charley formed the receiving end of the famous Detroit "Pretzel battery" of Getzeln and Gansel. The Gansel boys' parents will celebrate their golden wedding at their home in Kalamazoo, Mich., on Thanksgiving Day, and all their children and grandchildren to the number of fifty-two, expect to be present. Mr. and Mrs. Gansel, now have been singularly free from affliction. Of all their descendants only one has died, and they will be surrounded at the coming festivities by an almost unbroken family circle. They have had ten children in all—five boys and five girls.

The Clarkson family has contributed three pitchers to the diamond—John, the most famous pitcher in his day, and the first \$10,000 beauty the game ever knew; Arthur, who was a National League ten years ago, and Walter, who is now a member of the Highlanders.

The Bannon family is also one of ball players. They are really the only rivals of the famous Deleahant family. Bill Bannon, now goal tender for the Canton polo team, and his three

brothers, Jimmy, Tom and George, are all knights of the diamond. They all shine on the greensward and rank among the best players in the minor leagues. One of the quartet of brothers has been "up." Jimmy playing left field for Boston a few years back. He was in Columbus during the seasons of 1903-04. Last season he was manager-captain of the Montreal team in the Eastern League. He also played left field. He held the double berth of responsibility until a month before the close of the season. Old Malachi Kittredge, the former Washington catcher, succeeded him.

George Bannon started the season under the guiding wing of his brother Jim at Montreal. He finished the season with Toronto.

Tom Bannon was captain and played left field for the Lynn (Mass.) team in the New England League. Lynn finished second in the league race.

Bill Bannon is a giant in stature. He is considered the best goal tender in the polo world today. He has several rivals, but Bill is really in a class by himself. Bill can also play the national game of baseball. During the season just closed he played first base and was captain of the Hallowell (Me.) team, in the Maine Trolley League.

ELEVEN PLAYERS KILLED ON GRIDIRON THIS YEAR

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Eleven players were killed and 104 were injured in the United States during the football season of 1936, according to the Chicago Tribune today.

These figures are compared with the casualties of 1935, when 18 players were killed, and 159 were severely injured, and, according to the Tribune, show that "debrutalized" football has accomplished in a large degree the object aimed at in rendering the game less dangerous to life and limb.

The decrease in casualties is especially marked among high school players.

In the season of 1935, 11 high school players were killed and 47 injured, while in the season just closed 7 were killed and 25 were hurt.

All college and high school games this year were played under the new rules drawn up after the close of last season to satisfy the agitation for less dangerous football.

This year not one fatality has occurred in the game played by the larger American colleges.

HUNTING PLAYERS FOR PRO LEAGUE

Pittsburg Secretary Scouring Province—Glencoe Organized.

Toronto, Nov. 26.—Secretary Frank Danahay, of the Pittsburg hockey club, in the professional league, was in town yesterday on his way through the provinces on the lookout for players. Of last year's team they have Winchester in goal, Billy Baird at point, Hod Stuart (manager) at cover, and Lorne Campbell at center. Archer Sexsmith, last year's manager, has retired, and will likely be the local referee.

The scout from the south is after Johnson of the Montreal Wanderers, Horace Gaul of Ottawa, and Jack Marks, formerly of Belleville, now with New Glasgow, the Stanley cup champions, from the Maritime Provinces. He also wants Rolly Young of last year's Marlboros, but will scarcely draw the McMaster man from his studies. Danahay also wanted Chaucer Elliott to take up his quarters at Pittsburg as the local referee, but the expert will likely go to the Eastern League this year.

Ed Wettlaufer, of the O. H. A. executive, is in town today. He says the Berlin senior and intermediate hockey teams start training work for the season tonight at basketball. There are at least 50 hockey teams of all sorts in Berlin—shop teams, city and church leagues—and there will be no difficulty in rigging out strong sevens for the O. H. A.

He expects the western district will have senior teams in Berlin, Call, Stratford, Guelph, and possibly Preston, with one of the Toronto teams to fill out.

GLENCOE ORGANIZED. Glencoe, Ont., Nov. 25.—At a well-attended meeting held in the McAlpine House the Glencoe Hockey Club organized for 1936 and 1937. The prospects for a good season were never better. The following officers were elected: Honorary president, W. S. Calvert; honorary vice-president, W. K. Poucar; president, B. Kaufman; vice-president, Frank McRae; secretary-treasurer, T. B. McLean; manager, G. Parrot; captain, T. Harris; executive committee, S. R. Finlayson, H. Callahan, O. P. Howard. The secretary was instructed to write Dutton, West Lorne, Bothwell and Thamesville for the purpose of forming a hockey league.

BELLEVILLE IN FEDERAL. Belleville, Nov. 25.—Belleville has been offered a franchise in the Federal Hockey League and will likely accept. A meeting will be held in the Hotel Quinte Monday night. Several of the old-time stars are now here and a good team could be gotten together. The citizens are eager for good hockey and there will be no lack of financial support.

THE RING. LAVIGNE HAD BEST OF IT.

Windsor, Ont., Nov. 26.—In a well-fought bout here, Kid Lavigne, of Windsor, drove Kid Brendle, of Detroit, to the ropes in the seventh round. The match was scheduled to be ten rounds. During the first three rounds Brendle had decidedly the better of the fight, scoring points on Lavigne almost at will. But Lavigne in the fourth round took a decided brace, and from then on the battle was his. He led throughout the remaining four rounds, and in the seventh very neatly pounded Brendle into the ropes. It was a fairly won decision and everyone was satisfied.

MATCHED AGAIN.

New York, Nov. 26.—Following a meeting of their managers here today it was announced that "Terry" McGovern and Young Corbett had been matched for a bout not less than 15 rounds, to take place during the week ending Jan. 31. Each side posted a forfeit of \$1,000. Tim Hurst will referee the fight, for which bids will be accepted Dec. 3.

MATCHES FOR JOHNSON.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 26.—Big Jack Johnson, the colored heavyweight champion, is to sail for Australia shortly. Alec McLean, of Chelsea, who has been negotiating for matches in antipodes for the big fellow, has received a cablegram from the National Athletic Club, of Sydney, N. S. W., telling him his proposition for Johnson's services had been accepted by them and they would cable expenses for fighter and manager as soon as they are ready to start.

JEFFRIES SAYS CHANCES EVEN

Champion Has No Choice After a Visit to the Quarters of Burns and O'Brien.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 26.—James J. Jeffries, who will referee the bout between Tommy Burns and Jack O'Brien on Wednesday night, after having visited both men at their training camps, where he saw them work and examined them closely, was today asked for his opinion as to the probable winner. "There's no choice," replied the champion, "they have equal chances to win."

Jeffries visits to the fighters were made on Sunday. He and Manager McCarey visited Tommy Burns at his Long Beach camp for the purpose of having a final talk as regards articles governing the heavyweights' battle. It has been agreed to fight straight Marquis of Queensberry rules, and Burns was anxious to know just how much roughing would be allowed. Jeffries visited O'Brien at Venice yesterday and the Philadelphia said the trusted implicitly in Jeffries' ability to referee. Burns appears in magnificent condition, and Jeffries expressed himself as confident that he could not have attained better form. O'Brien is fit for the battle of his life, and a strong contender prevails here that the Philadelphia will need every ounce of strength which he possesses when he meets the husky Canadian.

O'Brien is confident of winning. He believes that his cleverness, generalship and punch will enable him to score a decisive victory over Burns, and, as the Canadian is the only one who has a better claim upon the premier honors of the heavyweight division, he is training with a view of wiping out that claim.

Burns will have a little more weight than O'Brien, but this will be made up by O'Brien in the advantage of reach and height.

GEORGE CALLS ON POPE.

Rome, Nov. 26.—King George of Greece, accompanied by his daughter, the Grand Duchess Michaelovitch of Russia, visited the Pope today, and were most cordially received.

After leaving the Quirinal Palace King George drove to the British embassy, where his daughter was stopping, and with her went to the Greek legation. There they entered a private carriage and were driven to the Vatican, where they were received with royal honors by the members of the papal court.

The Pope welcomed the visitors in the throne-room, Monsignor Delenda, Archbishop of Athens, acting as interpreter.

King George will leave Italy tomorrow, embarking for Greece at Brindisi.

WOULDN'T DISCUSS ENGLISH JOCKEYS

Maher Had Been Misquoted Several Times, and Refused to Say Anything More.

New York, Jan. 26.—Danny Maher, the American jockey, has arrived from England, where he spent the past racing season.

"I rode this season," he said, when asked to talk about his experiences abroad, "for Lord Derby. Yes, I was successful, finishing first 103 times out of 500 mounts, and second and third so often that I lost the count."

"The chief event in which I took part was the Derby, in which I piloted Spearmint to victory. There were twelve entries and I will say it was the most exciting race in which I ever took part and go from the start to almost the finish of the mile-and-a-half course."

"I thought the race was in doubt up to the last quarter, when I gave Spearmint his head, and he finished two lengths ahead of his field. It was a far more exciting race in every way than that of the previous year, when my mount came in second."

"Are the English jockeys adopting any of the American methods?" he was asked.

"I do not wish to comment upon the English jockeys at all," answered Maher. "I have been misquoted often in a manner which did me no good with an English turfman and I must decline to answer that question."

Maher had not been on the other side many weeks before many stories concerning him were cabled to this country. One was to the effect that he had won the heart of a daughter of the aristocracy and would marry and settle down in England.

It was further said that he contemplated renouncing his citizenship and becoming a naturalized subject of the King.

These stories he contradicted in a cable message, and since his contradiction they have not been repeated.
