NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Newspapers here today publish the following dispatch from Washington: An entire Austrian regiment, with officers at its head, and carrying their own arms, has surrendered to Rumanians along the Russian-Rumanian front, according to cables received here today. The report stated that the regiment was composed aimost entirely of Mohammedan Serbs from Bosnia. The colonel declared that they were all Jugo Slavs and surrendered voluntarily in order to enlist in the Jugo Slav legion now being formed out of the reorganized Serb army.

The recent agreement between the Serbian Government at Corfu and the Jugo Slav committee in London, with respect to the establishment of a Jugo Slav state is being received with enthusiasm by the Slav population in Austria-Hungary, the colonel stated. The officers of the regiment declared they expected fresh desertions, especially among the Czechs and Croatian solders.
