Continues With Success.

Portuguese and Anglo-Belgian Units Closing In From All Sides.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Sustained purguit of the German forces in German Bast Africa, during which nearly 1,800 prisoners were captured, important positions occupied, and the last heavy gun remaining to the Germans in the colony taken intact, is reported in an official statement today.

The text reads:
"Continuing the pursuit on the Makonde Plateau we occupied Lutshemi on Saturday in the face of considerable opposition; and took rifles. On Sunday we occupied a large enemy camp northwest of the Kitangari mission station, capturing 976 Germans and askaris. The remainder of the enemy has been driven in the Kitangari Walley.
"The Portuguese are approaching Newala from the south.
"The last of the enemy's 4.1 howitzers was taken intact on the Mahiwandanda road, where it had been abandoned.
"Near Mandebi, 38 miles southwest of Liwale, the Anglo-Beiglan force was engaged on Thursday and Friday with the enemy, who was endeavoring to break southward from Mahenge.
"Exclusive of the enemy losses at Mandebi, 798 Germans have been killed or captured by our various columns since November 1."

U.S. WILL HOLD UP RUSSIAN SUPPLIES TILL STRIFE STOPS

Bunker Coal Will Be Denied Ships Commissioned.

WILL TAKE NO CHANCES

If Bolsheviki Gain Control, Embargo Will Be Permanent.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—No ship-ments of supplies will be permitted to go from the United States to Russia until the situation in that country clears. The American Government be-fore allowing the export of goods al-ready on the docks wants to know into whose hands they will fall on their arrival.

The cessation of shipments is temporary only, if a stable government is formed which the United States can recognize. If the Bolsheviki gain control and pursue their program, calling, for a peace with Germany, the embargo will be permanent. A protracted civil war also would work to keep the embargo tight, as the United States then would fear that supplies might go to the Bolsheviki faction.

The provisional Russian Government was given credit amounting in all to \$325,000,000, of which \$191,000,000 already had been advanced. Much of this money has been spent for supplies now awaiting shipment, and the Russians have been given vessels for transport purposes. Instructions will be given to deny bunker coal to these ships.

Twenty Witnesses Called in HEAVY CASUALTIES

Mr. O'Connor has issued a statement with a view to correcting certain misunderstandings regarding the female rote in the coming election. 
REQUIRED DECEMBER 1
