

BLENHIM'S MAYOR, A LEADING CONTRACTOR, DIES VERY SUDDENLY

Father of ex-Ald. A. J. Morgan, This City, Passes Away.

HAD AN EVENTFUL CAREER

Was One of Best Known Public Works Builders in Western Ontario.

Mayor George Morgan of Blenheim, father of ex-Ald. A. J. Morgan of this city and one of the best known contractors in Western Ontario, died at his home in Blenheim on Friday morning following a short illness. A week ago he motored to London and only returned to Blenheim last Monday. On his way he visited Port Stanley and viewed the work he had done there many years ago. He was particularly impressed by the improvements of recent years.

Until the time of his death Mr. Morgan was in perfect health and a man of unusual activity. He was 73 years of age and last year celebrated his golden birthday. He is survived by one son, A. J. Morgan of this city and two daughters, Mrs. F. E. Tiff of Erie and Mrs. Arthur Brown of Leamington.

Mr. Morgan was the son of the late Arthur Morgan, who was born in Ireland in 1835 and settled in Howard township near Morpeth. He was prominently known in the Western Ontario district from Windsor to London as a builder and contractor, having been often called in consultation by prominent government and civil engineers.

Early in life Mr. Morgan went to California by the then overland Panama route and it was while in this Pacific coast that he had his first training in bridge building. In 1861 he built the Harwich Township Hall which is still standing, and in 1875 was awarded the medal at the Kent county fair for the best threshing machine of any make.

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He was prominent in civic life, having for the past 15 years been a member of the Blenheim municipal council and a councillor. He has also filled many other public positions. In fractional politics he has been a member in the L. O. O. F. for 35 years and was a member of the A. O. U. W. He was a Baptist in religion.
