## LONDON TP. SCHOOL

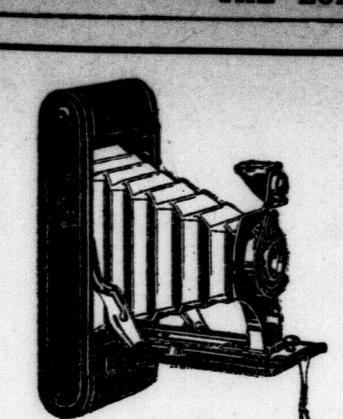

## A PRIZE-WINNER

McCLARY COMPANY  
BUYS BUCK PLANT  
TO AID PRODUCTION

Deal Completed For Large Addition To Firm's Output.

EMPLOYEES STAFF OF 300  
Plant Will Remain in Brantford—Col. Gartshore and Mr. Gunn To Close Deal.

Announcement was made today by Lieut. Col. W. C. Gartshore that the McClary Manufacturing Company of this city has closed negotiations for the purchase of the Buck Stove Company of Brantford.

Col. Gartshore and J. M. Gunn of the local office will go to Brantford tomorrow to take over the Buck plant formally for the McClary Company.

While no hint of the price paid for the Buck Company was given, a large sum was involved, as the Buck Company is one of the largest stove companies in Canada, employing 300 men, and doing a coast-to-coast business in ranges and furnaces.

The plant will be maintained at Brantford, and no time will be lost in operation, although rebuilding operations necessitated by a serious fire in the factory, capable of full production. The Buck Company is identified with the manufacture of the "Happy Thought" range, and 30 molders are at work at present.

McClary expansion in the city of Brantford has been constant and extensive, but the company has so far failed to its resources by the purchase within a few years of three large Canadian stove companies. At present, the purchases have a bearing on the expansion of headquarters in London, which is the centre for a chain of factories and warehouses that extend across the continent.

It is expected that a further announcement in regard to the purchase will be made on the return of Col. Gartshore and Mr. Gunn from Brantford.

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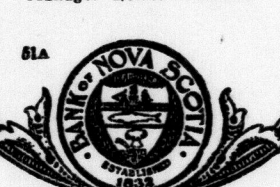

POLICE SERGEANT  
OBJECTS TO REPORTER  
SEEING ARREST MADE

Aged Man Receives Bumps at Hands of Law.

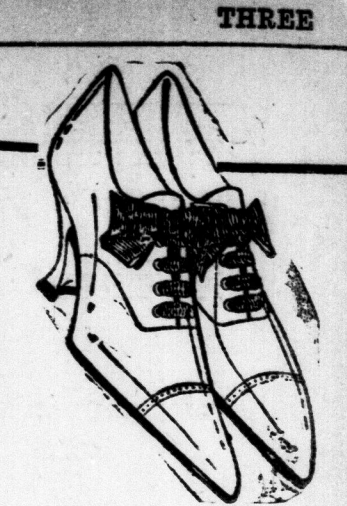
While walking along Princess avenue near Waterloo street at an early hour this morning, an Advertiser reporter, hearing loud talking, proceeded to investigate. The investigation revealed the fact that two constables were scuffling with a man on a lawn, and as the scribe drew near one of them walked to a nearby house to phone for the police. The man was talking loudly and it is presumed that he was arrested for being intoxicated.

However, as the reporter drew near the constable holding the prisoner said: "Get up on your feet," and grasping him firmly by the shoulder lifted the unfortunate one in the air, then dropped him heavily on all fours to the ground. At this juncture the other constable, who happened to be the recently-promoted Sergeant William McCullough, said to the reporter in loud, official tones: "Is there anything you want? You don't care where you come from? You better move on, and keep moving." As there were two constables present, the scribe proceeded to leave for home, but not before the constable again roughly picked up his charge and dropped him heavily to the ground this time upon his knees. All took place under Sergeant McCullough's jurisdiction, he viewing the occurrence.

The prisoner was in shirt-sleeves, and wore slippers. He had been removed from his house by the police. As the reporter left he heard the man say in a plaintive tone: "I am not drunk, I am an old man, and you are a young man." During the rough treatment, the victim used profane language, for which he could hardly be blamed, and the mauling was no doubt intended to still the violent words.

The scribe viewing the occurrence opined that the police wished to continue their harsh treatment of the aged prisoner, but not desiring any witnesses ordered him to move. He did, however, remark that he had just viewed both bluecoats handling the prisoner as they did while he was previously approaching them. Residents of the vicinity also viewed the scene from bedroom windows nearby.

The alleged intoxicated one was later removed to the police station via the police auto and this morning Magistrate Graydon allowed him his freedom without a fine.

JARED VINING'S  
NEW CHAIRMAN

Succeeds J. G. Richter as the Head of Court of Revision.

Jared Vining was elected to the chairmanship of the court of revision at a meeting Thursday night. He succeeded J. G. Richter in that position. Mr. Richter having resigned in order to co-operate in revision of the assessment.

The court dealt with a large number of appeals. Chief among these was application from two local brewers for remission of taxes. As in former years the court remitted one-half. In last year's revision provincial government has remitted the whole amount. It remains to be seen whether the Drury government will also follow this practice.

Several appeals were made against business tax, the applicants stating that they were now out of business. The city council some time ago took away from the revision court the right to make any remission on these taxes. All the applications accordingly were refused. Other appeals were made on errors in assessment and income assessment. The statute labor tax levied against several soldiers was remitted on the grounds that they had not been back from France for more than a year.

He will speak on "Co-operation and What It Means to the High Cost of Living."

Mrs. Mary McNab of Hamilton will present a paper. Dr. H. A. Stevenson will preside.

Those behind the movement hope to interest at least 500 citizens in the project. Provisions will be made for capital to commence the store and will form its customers.

Provisions will be made for the plan to extend it to other articles. They hope to establish a co-operative wholesale house within the near future.

All that could be learned this morning, while Mr. Cunliffe was on his knees painting, was that investigation was coming along in good shape, and that the G. W. V. A. would soon be ready to start the city.

**LEAVING CITY.**—Mr. and Mrs. Fred McCormick and their two children, Sault Ste. Marie, where they intend to make their future home. Mr. McCormick, who has been a popular employee of Smallman & Ingram for some time, and formerly manager for the London branch of the Standard Woolen Mills, has accepted a position as manager and buyer for a large gent's furnishings store at the city.

of paying higher wages, but of course all hope of this is gone now.

All Stopped.

General Manager Buchanan of the utilities commission reported that he had ordered all construction work stopped. The men employed at this are now doing maintenance work, and none of them is out of employment.

It is estimated that about 20 per cent of the work to be authorized by the bill has already been done. The commission must now find other means of financing this, as no more water mains will be laid on streets which the city is at present engaged in paving and this may result in a good deal of the paving work being held up.

No more electric extensions will be made, and it will cause a decided delay in the city as to be connected with the electrical system.

Storm Sewers.

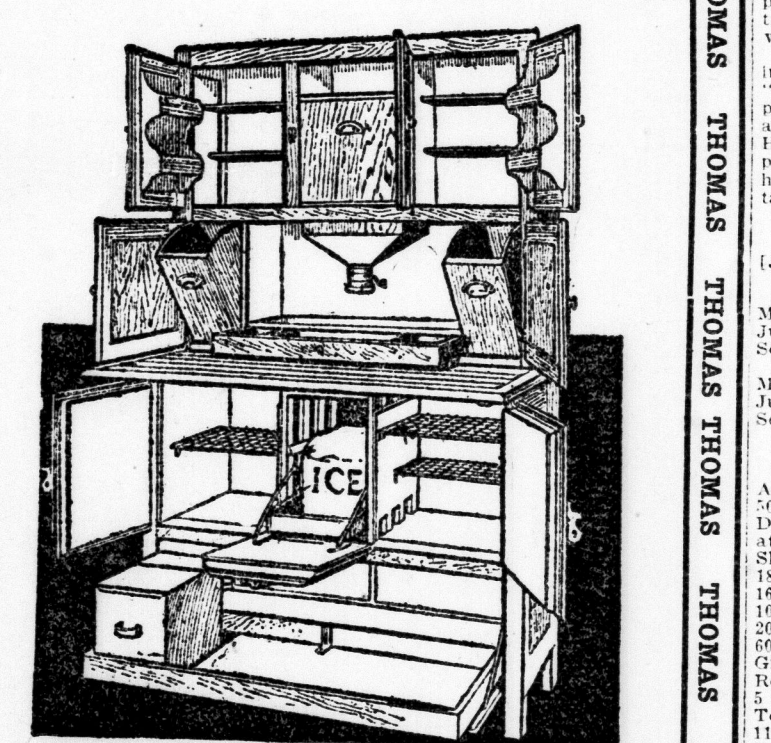
The refusal of an appropriation for storm sewers will not affect street work this year, but will cause a decided delay next year. According to City Engineer Reuter, pavements cannot be laid until the storm sewers are constructed. This will mean that the city cannot carry out its share of the work on the government highway. It was planned to pave Dundas street from Ashland avenue to the city limits. This will be delayed now until the people authorize a storm sewer for the street. Some of the storm sewers were intended for West London, others for a section surrounding Edward street, Hamilton road from Elm street to the limits, and Wellington road south of the river.

The defeat of the bill will also likely mean that no steps can be taken to build a new home for Incubables. If, passed, would have authorized the city to lend \$100,000 for this purpose on a first mortgage. The project will likely be laid over for a year.
