As soon as the spur track used for sawing steel rails, will be erected, while others will be built later. The concrete and steel for the huge saw are expected to arrive from Montreal this week. built at least one building, to be

BACHELOR HOME PROVIDED FOR IN \$3,000,000 WILL



CROP CONDITIONS IN WEST POINT

Winnipeg, June 8 .- In presenting its second crop report for 1920, the Manitoba Free Press announces that it indicates about the best condition ince 1904, when these with possibly the single exception of 1912, when the June crop conditions were as nearly perfect as it is possible to hope for. This present report is much more encouraging than the early June report of the famous bumper year of 1915, as during the early part of June of that year heavy frosts occurred, and the crop had not fully recovered from them.

The last week of May there were very high winds reported, and there was serious apprehension of damage from this source. The reports indicate that the heavy rains and cool weather have not only stopped the drifting and blowing, but that to a very great extent the crop has recovered without reseeding being necessary. Where seeding has

been done it is mainly oats. Very grave apprehension has existed as to grasshoppers. and all. correspondents in the affected areas were asked as to hoppers. The replies on the whole show that the wet weather has retarded hatching, but whether permanently or not remains to be seen. All that human energy can do, is being done to prevent a spread of the plague should hotter weather develop them.

The strong feature of the report is the abundant supply of moisture throughout the entire west. Only nine points report any need of rain, and these points add that there is plenty of surface moisture, but showers are needed to help germinate the last sown grain. Under general conditions, the report could scarcely be more optimistic, "never better," "ideal," and similar expressions abounding.

Philip Pocock Discusses Figures of London and Port Stanley Railway.

Philip Pocock, vice-chairman of the Stanley finances issued by A. E. Ingram, vice-chairman of the Ontario railway and municipal board, Monday was decidedly inaccurate.

Mr. Ingram claimed that the annual Mr. Ingram claimed that the annual fixed charges on the road were \$76,000, and that the road paid a yearly rental of only \$20,000. This meant a deficit of \$56,000 yearly, he said. Mr. Pocock claimed that the railway commission only leases the road form the said. inly leases the road from the city, and stherefore only responsible for the harges on the money invested in the

Mr. Ingram states that the road was electrified at a cost of \$1\overline{14}\), 4348, and that debentures were issued for this would mean fixed charges of \$64.622. Mr. Pocock, states that the actual cost of electrification was only \$1.131.000. while \$103.000 of surplus earnings had been reinvested in the road. The interest charges are paid by the earnings of the road and not by the city.

Says Coal Cheaper.

Mr. Ingram also charged, that coal and passenger rates were higher than on other roads. Mr. Pocock asserts that coal is being brought into the city 50 cents a ton cheaper on the L. and P. S. R. than on other roads. Passenger rates are 2.8750 cents a mile compared to 3.45 cents a mile on steam roads, he asserted.

Mr. Ingram said that the figures he quotes are the reason why the road asked the Provincial Legislature for an additional debenture issue of \$105.000 this year.
