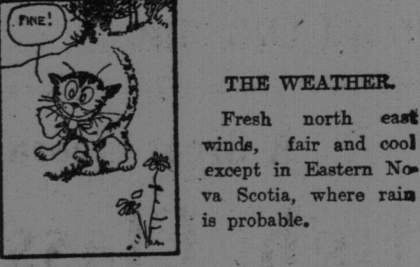

TRADES DISPUTES IN CANADA DURING JULY

Montreal, Aug. 28.—(Special)—The total number of trades disputes reported to the labor department as being in existence in July was 10, compared with 14 in June and 30 in July last year. About 76 firms and 1,384 employees are affected. Of the ten disputes, seven were definitely settled, the employers being successful in 5 cases and the employees in two.

Desmond Elliot. Both Lord and Lady Minto come of families long connected with the Diplomatic Service. An ancestor of Lord Minto's held the appointment of Lieutenant-Governor of New York (then an English possession) nearly two hundred years ago, while the first Earl was Governor-General of Bengal, in his day. A London writer considers it a curious coincidence that he should have been succeeded by his brother-in-law, Lady Minto's brother, Earl Grey.

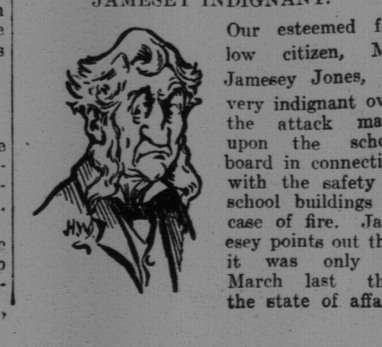
HALIFAX AHEAD AT GOLF
