New Brunswick's Cheese Output in 1916 Was 1,185,664 Pounds Valued at \$210,693

Ottawa, Sept. 26.—The total production of creamery butter in Canada in 1916, according to a bulletin issued by Harbo the census and statistics office, was 82,-564,130 pounds, valued at \$26,966,855. The production was slightly less than in 1915, when 83,991,453 pounds represented the output of the dominion. 
