

COMPULSORY INSURANCE ON ALL ELEVATORS

At the inquest into the death of William H. Smith who-died on October vator collapsed in the warehouse of J. S. Frost, Smythe street, which was held last evening in the court house the jury returned a verdict that Mr. Smith died from injuries and shock received from the breaking of a cable and the falling of an elevator, and being in a weakened condition from the use of alcohol was unable to stand the said shock. They strongly recommended that all owners of freight elevators place a sign warning people from going on them and embodied in their recommendation part of the testimony given by John Kenney, machine and factory inspector for New Brunswick, It was as follows: That the provincial government be requested to amend the Factories Act at the earliest opportunity by adding a section making it compulsory for the owner or user of a power elevator to insure the same in some standard insurance company duly authorized in the province for that purpose." He said that these companies have in their employ expert inspectors who would see that the elevators were kept in a safe condition. 
