**THE IRISH WITH THE ALLES**  
T. P. O'Connor's Story Emphasizes The Statement  
The London Daily Chronicle publishes an article by T. P. O'Connor, M.P., drawing attention to the remarkable part that Ireland and the Irish are playing in the European war, and dealing more specifically with the Irish in the United States. Mr. O'Connor says:  
"There was no part of the world where anti-English influences worked so powerfully as in the United States. All most every Irishman there is a son or grandson of an evicted tenant—evicted in all the horrors and sufferings of the Black Forties, and most of them had heard stories of these wrongs at their mother's knees."  
"In addition to the old doctrine of revolution and anti-English sentiment, there was German money and a German propaganda headed by Professor Kump Meyer, that false friend who, while loved by Irishmen as a great Celtic scholar, but he is not a native of Ireland, did not in private conversation ever hesitate to express contempt for their national aspirations."  
"The well-subsidized and well-organized campaign has failed. Of the Irish in the United States up to 85 or 90 per cent. are with Mr. Redmond and his trumpet-tongued on the attitude of Irishmen to England. In 1867 five Irishmen were sentenced to death for an attempt in which a police sergeant was killed. Three—Allen, Larkin and O'Brien—were hanged, and today live in the Irish mythology. One was liberated. The other was reprieved because he had the good luck to be an Irish-American citizen, but he did not escape scot-free for he served nine years' penal servitude, and in days when penal servitude meant starvation and other horrors of a less humane period."  
"His name is Captain O'Meara Condon, and he is loved and honored by every Nationalist in the world. Since his liberation he has lived in the United States, but he is on the side of England and her allies. An old fighter for freedom, how could he take any other side?"

**PINDER ATTACKS HON. MR. McLEOD**

Bitter Reply to Charges Against Himself  
Says Former Colleague Inspired Investigation—Talks of "Political Parities"—Public Accounts Chairmanship

Fredricton, March 22—A sensational attack upon his former colleague, and former provincial secretary, Hon. H. F. McLeod, was made in the legislature this evening by James K. Pinder, M.P.P. His attack was the more remarkable because he was the man who nominated Mr. McLeod for the dominion parliament. Mr. Pinder read a carefully prepared statement criticising the report submitted by Commissioner Pringle and the motives which had inspired the investigation.  
Later in the evening Mr. Pinder referred to the newspaper discussion of his position as chairman of the public accounts committee, and said that he was willing to resign that position, as he was not given to him, and had made no threats of what he would do if it were not given to him. He did not refer to the threats made by his friends. He complained that the Liberals had not all been dismissed, and they were responsible for the trouble of the government. He was still Conservative and ready to defend the party at any time, but with the Liberals tacked on it was a different proposition.  
In his statement regarding the Southamptown Railway inquiry, he said: "I view this inquiry as a very important one, and the course of this inquiry was directed or influenced by a small group of political partisans, the present member for this county at Ottawa. With many others in this county, I had hoped that honorable gentlemen would attempt to ride roughshod over the rank and file of the Conservative party. The facts are familiar to all of you and I will not take up your time to discuss them. We were beaten by means of a convention packed with hoodlums and hangers on, and the avish use of the shew of war."  
McLeod's Backers Stuck?  
In passing, I may remark that it is rumored that some of those who were such ardent supporters of Hon. H. F. McLeod, that occasion and lent the influence of their names to the financial end of the campaign, have had occasion to view the result of the campaign. It appears, do not consider promissory notes as mere "scraps of paper."  
The Speaker, who was the influence moving and prompting Mr. Walsh (the engineer) in doing his work and in making his estimates. When all the circumstances are considered there is abundant evidence that the investigation developed into an organized conspiracy, having in view the end of discrediting me, and for the people of this county and of driving me from public life. I have here a good many years in public life in this county, with little reward or remuneration, and I do not propose now to sacrifice party interests and personal friendship if considerations of honor and integrity demanded that this had to be done."  
"I do not desire to cast any unwarranted reproach upon anyone but you are all well acquainted with Mr. McLeod's record, and I feel that you are competent judges as to whether or not his record is such as would lead you to come to the conclusion that he has always been prompted in matters of this kind by such high principles of honor and integrity."  
Hard Knocks for McLeod.  
Mr. McLeod in parliament stated that he was familiar, very familiar, with the Southampton Railway from its conception to its completion. He was a member of the government of this province from 1908 to 1912, and he was authorized in 1912, and as such actually endorsed every one of the bonds that were guaranteed, as he claims, he was familiar with these facts as set forth by Mr. Carvell, how is he able to explain his conduct in 1912 in endorsing the bonds of the company to the further extent of \$2,000,000 a mile? What comes of all this great display of solicitude for the welfare of its constituents, with which he closed his remarkable speech on that occasion? If Mr. McLeod knew that there was wrong being done—and he himself says he knew all about the matter—why did he keep silent until the matter was brought up in the house by a political opponent?  
"There is one explanation and only one for the remarkable course taken by Mr. McLeod. It is found, indeed, in a speech delivered on that occasion, and that was his desire to give expression to his personal animosity against me, and to accomplish this purpose he was ready to become a willing and possibly an unconscious victim at the hands of Mr. Carvell."

shortest possible route. In order for this to be done it would be necessary for them to pass over certain crown lands. Mr. Thomson has given an undertaking to protect the woods from fire, as a result of his line running through the crown lands, and in addition he was paying \$2 an acre for the land. The arrangement was a benefit of both the department and Mr. Thomson.  
Hon. Mr. Murray introduced a bill to authorize the rector, church warden and vestry of the parish of Kingston in the county of Kings, to wind up their school fund.  
In dealing with a bill relating to motor vehicles, a section exempting from taxation motor trucks and other vehicles owned by a city or municipality and operated only within the city limits, Mr. Murray stated that he was not going to vote for it unless it was read that no fee should be payable for any motor vehicle used for ambulance or fire purposes.
