

FINING OF BODY REVIVES GAMMON MYSTERY

HUMAN REMAINS REPORTED FOUND AT STEWACKE

Searchers, However, Fail to Locate Spot Where Workers Reported Discovery

QUEST WILL BE CONTINUED TODAY

Missing Pictou Woman Not Seen Since 1924—Husband Faced Murder

HALIFAX, July 16.—The reported discovery of human remains under a bridge near New Glasgow, Colchester County, revived yesterday the mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Sarah Gammon whose husband, Duncan Gammon of Pictou, had told the police he had last seen his wife on a dock in Quebec City, whence she had embarked in September, 1924, for England on a boat, the name of which had not been learned. Gammon was later held on a charge of having murdered his wife and the authorities believed he had been hidden at some point along the main highway between Halifax and Pictou. Gammon was later released by the courts with the charge of murder still holding in the event of the body ever being discovered.

DAIRY INSPECTOR GIVES LAST WARNING

Dr. T. F. Johnston Reports Milk Dealers Handling Raw Product

Dr. J. Fred Johnston, dairy inspector of the Board of Health staff, this morning inspected delivery wagons of nearly all of the dealers before they began routing their milk. He was handling the unpasteurized article in disobedience to the original Health Act and the recently added stipulations concerning Grade A milk from tested cattle. As the inspector's instructions, given him at yesterday's special meeting of the Board of Health, were to give the dealers final warning against this practice, no seizures were made. The dealers pled the inspector with questions about the new regulations and were given full instructions as to the procedure necessary for the handling of unpasteurized milk. It was made very distinct to them that persons found with raw milk for sale after today will be called to the Police Court process.
