**EARLY HISTORY TOLD IN PRINTS AND WRITINGS**

Saint John Archives Office Opened With Alluring Display

MUCH IS THERE TO GRIP ATTENTION

Pictures of Early Scenes in New Brunswick Among the Exhibits.

New Brunswick history since its earliest beginnings is attractively set forth in the archive rooms of the Dominion Savings Bank building today under the direction of Major Gustav Lanctot, K. C., archivist, from Ottawa. Major Lanctot was very busy this morning arranging pictures and documents so that all might be seen to the best advantage. He said he was endeavoring to make the exhibit one of special interest to students, so that facts concerning New Brunswick might be available for writers, historians and any who wished to know about the interesting beginnings and accomplishments of this province.

**OF MUCH INTEREST**

To those who think that archives mean dry old papers, with illegible writing and uninteresting information, a visit to the archive room, which was opened informally at 10 o'clock, with several visitors at that hour, disabuses the mind. Documents and maps are plentiful, but on first entering the room one is impressed that a select art gallery has been opened for the benefit of the public. The pictures are quaint, rich in coloring and in many cases amusing. Plans for a dry dock to be built at Navy Island are shown dated 1828.

**FASHIONABLES OF 1834**

One picture shows the "New Brunswick Fashionables" with three descriptions after the statement. They are assembling for a sleighing party in January, 1834, at "Fredericktown." The dresses of the ladies, pelices and bonnets are various in color and the whole is most decorous appearance. The name of the producer of the picture is a familiar one in New Brunswick history. "Francis Beverley, bookseller, stationer and binder, of Fredericktown." Nearly all the pictures are scenes of winter, where any festivities are under way.

Where industry flourishes, lovely woodland scenes, with pretty greenery, men at work, with camp fires in the background and bright splashes of color from flowers, mill wheels and windmills have given hope in those early days that there was something besides snow in New Brunswick.

**SAM SLICK**

Judge Haliburton ("Sam Slick") is shown in a clever pen-and-ink drawing as a noble animal. The drawing was done by Mr. Torre, of Halifax, N. S. The picture of the Blizard property on Long Island and the old time assembly of the officers of the "Fredericktown" in 1824, in February, are not unknown to Saint John people. Mrs. Thomas Bustin, who lives in a street passes a similar picture. Stephen Blizard was married to Miss Bustin, sister of the late Thomas Bustin, and when Mrs. Blizard died after her husband, she left the picture to her sister-in-law, Mrs. Bustin.

**BOOK SECTION**

A bookcase holds books that are substantial in binding, and have some alluring titles. A book of dispatches sent from the British secretary of state from 1827 to 1840 is available for students. It shows the handwriting of the many secretaries through the years and is a work of art. Oliver Cromwell's handwriting is seen and that of General Amherst, to Colonel Monckton in letters written in 1758. Those who visit the room are advised to have no other engagement for several hours, to absorb the privileges of the opportunity offered.

The Saint John office is under the direction of Dr. J. D. Leary, of Halifax, and Miss Vera Daye is assistant archivist here.

**GUIDES WILL CAMP ON THE SAINT JOHN**

Party Away to Beasley's Point—Others Plan Outing Later in Summer.

A party of Girl Guide campers left on the steamer Hampton today to get under canvas at Beasley's Point on the Saint John River. The party is in charge of Miss Irene Barber, captain of the 6th St. Paul's company, which is represented by 16 Guides. Those who were expected four Guides from Trinity company and six or eight from St. John's (Stone) company with Miss Margaret Anderson as leader. The camp will be in progress until July 13. Ten of the Guides of the 1st Rothery company are expected to join the other campers at Beasley's Point on Saturday. They will be in charge of Miss Ruth Starr and will go up by motor. The 2nd Rothery company will go into camp at Purdy's Point some time later this season and Miss Dorothy Purdy will be in charge. St. James company of Girl Guides with Miss Allen in charge will have a camp at Pinehurst just above Purdy's Point on the Saint John River from July 7 to 20. They are expecting to have five Girl Guides from Sackville and one from Knox company share camp pleasures.

**WANT WATER SERVICE.**

An agitation to have a modern water supply would appear to be made none too soon, said a resident of Fairville Plateau this morning. He said the people there, numbering 20 families, are using water from a common well, which is not dug deeply. The residents had a meeting on Tuesday evening to plan a campaign on the matter.

**Dog Licenses Make Record**

Last year there were issued 1,472 licenses, while this year, up to noon today, there had been given out 1,530 licenses. Of those 95 were issued on June 29 and 106 on June 30. From today those who come will have to pay double rate.

**EXPECTING 150 AT PYTHIAN MEETING**

Grand Lodge of Maritimes Next Month in Fredericton—Saint John Well Represented.

The Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias of the Maritime Province, will convene at Fredericton for a three-day session, beginning on Tuesday, August 18. It is expected 150 accredited delegates will be present and the proceedings will be especially interesting because of the presence of Hon. John Ballantyne of Boston, head of the Pythian Order of the world. For a portion of the convention Grand Chancellor Bayard Stillewell of Saint John will preside. The grand vice-chancellor is Capt. J. A. Mowry, also of this city.

The Pythian sisterhood will also hold its grand temple convention in Fredericton at the same time. It is expected the Saint John lodges and temples will send between 50 and 75 delegates to the provincial capital. Definite plans for the Grand Lodge have not been printed as yet, but there is a suggestion that the Supreme Chancellor receive special recognition from the Saint John lodges during his stay in the province.

**THREE TO BE NAMED FOR SCHOOL BOARD**

Terms of Two Trustees Expired on June 30, and One a Year Ago.

The terms of two members of the Board of School Trustees expired on June 30 last, and the term of one expired on June 30 of last year. Of these, two appointments are made by the city council and one by the government. The two city appointments are Mr. W. Palmer and Michael Coll. The term of Mr. Coll was up a year ago, but he holds office until his successor has been named. Mr. Palmer was appointed by the council to complete the unexpired term of G. E. Day. Thomas Magle is the government appointee whose term expired on last Tuesday. Recently a petition was sent to the city council asking that when an appointment was made at the expiration of the term of Mr. Palmer that a North End man be named as one of the city schools were located in that portion of the city. This was laid on the table to be dealt with when the appointment was under consideration.

**G. SINIBALDI GETS FREAK WHITE TROUT**

"Corkscrew" One Taken at Loch Lomond—Two Big Red Fish Also.

G. Sinibaldi, skilled welder of the fishing rod and line, brought several more trophies out of Loch Lomond on the holiday. One is a freak large white trout, long and thin, with a hooked salmon, or white trout as it is popularly called. The spine near the tail is curved in corkscrew fashion and the fisherman natively remarked that it was of a species supposed to be extinct with the adoption of prohibition in the province. Mr. Sinibaldi also caught a splendid red trout of over three pounds in the lake and took one weighing two pounds out of the brook at knee the morning after. The larger one was being shown at the Admiral Beatty today by Manager H. H. Peters and was much admired by visitors.

**TWO STEAMERS NOW**

Prince Arthur Joins Governor Dingley For Summer Rush on Boston Route.

The steamer Prince arrived this morning at 6:30 o'clock on her first trip of the season on the Saint John-Boston route. She brought 150 passengers. The Arthur is commanded by Captain McKinnon who was in charge of the steamer all last year. She will sail again tomorrow and will operate during the tourist season, running two round trips a week direct. The Governor Dingley also continues in service.

**Bank Clearings Again Are Higher**

For the third week in succession the Saint John bank clearings have shown an increase over those of last year. The figures for the week ending today are: \$2,043,942; last year, \$1,983,211; in 1923, \$2,720,629. Halifax clearings this week were \$2,586,053.

**CONSISTENT RECORD.**

Graduations and school closing honors do not always tell the whole story about success. A teacher states that Ruth Watters of Indiantown who graduated tenth in the honor list from the High School on Tuesday had been in the forefront of her classes from the first standard, holding the highest average in all standards up to the eighth, where her average mark of 93 on entering High School was a record one at that time for Alexandra school. The North End girl has won several prizes for proficiency.

**VISITED PRINCIPAL.**

After the close of the graduation exercises in St. Vincent's High School on Tuesday, the graduating class of 41 pupils went to the Saint John Infirmary in charge of their acting principal, Sister Magdalen, to visit Sister Angela, their principal, who is recovering after a serious operation. Sister Angela was not strong enough to meet all her pupils, but they stood in the hall near her door and sang their graduating songs, making sweet music through the halls for all the sick people.

**IS FINED \$200.**

Benjamin Dunlap pleaded guilty before Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning to a charge of supplying intoxicating liquor and was fined \$200 or six months in jail. The arrest was made by Policemen McElhinney and Welford.

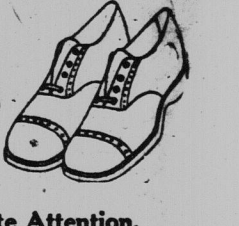
