New York, Aug. 1.—Willie Hoppe has decided to come back to competitive billiards. This decision on the part of

the man who held the world's 182 ball-line championship for fifteen years and still is the 181 king was formally announced by his manager, I. B. Benjamin. Reports have been current for a week or more that Hoppe was reconsidering his determination to retire from competition.

It was soon after his unsuccessful attempt to regain the world's championship in a challenge match from Jake Schaefer that Hoppe announced that he had decided to retire and devote all of his time to managing a string of billiard rooms throughout the larger cities in the east in conjunction with Benjamin and Charles Peterson, a fancy shot expert of St. Louis, who for so long had been Hoppe's partner on his exhibition tours of the country. He said that the cause for this action was the fact that under the existing rules governing champion competition it would be impossible for him again to play for the title until late in the season of 1923.

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Champion Declares He Tried His Hardest and is Satisfied With Showing.

Leonard and Billy Gibson, the champion manager, were interviewed immediately after the fight. "Southpaws are hard to solve," said Leonard. They present a difficult style for a boxer with a natural pose. I found difficulty in solving Teague's peculiar style from the outset. I am disappointed that I was unable to knock my rival out. I must admit, I fought me a hard, worthy battle. I tried my utmost to score a knockout. I was in perfect condition and supremely confident. Possibly in my eagerness to score a knockout, I overlooked many opportunities. I am satisfied, however, that I outpointed Teague by a clear margin on points. I hope my legion of friends and admirers and the great crowd which witnessed the bout are satisfied. I want them to know I tried my hardest. But, as I said before, southpaws are hard to solve."

"I am satisfied that Leonard has shown himself a wonderful champion," declared Gibson. "He has just emerged from a hard struggle with colors flying. I don't think there is any doubt that the champion outpointed the challenger. I myself think Benny won by a clear margin on points. I cannot truthfully say that I am disappointed that Benny didn't score a knockout. He was confronted with a wicked luffer in an unnatural style, a boxer whose very pose made him a difficult target for a clean decisive punch. Benny landed several hard rights to the jaw during the fight and several times staggered Teague. While he failed to stop Teague, I am satisfied that Benny won with plenty to spare."

TENDLER THINKS HE OUTPOINTED LEONARD

Challenger is Anxious to Meet Champion Again—His Manager Disappeared.  
Tender and his manager, Phil Glassman, were interviewed in the challenger's dressing quarters soon after the fight ended. "I honestly think that I won the bout," said Tandler, "but I will leave that matter for the public to decide. I fought my hardest and gave the best that was in me. I am most anxious to meet the champion again, and I am confident that if given another chance, I can demonstrate my superiority in more convincing fashion. I nearly had Leonard out in the seventh or eighth round. I can't remember which. During the course of the fight Leonard declared that he was going to knock me out, but I retorted that it couldn't be done. After the bout Leonard said 'You're the greatest kid I ever fought.' I had trouble with my leg in the early rounds due to the padding on the floor of the ring, which was so soft to suit me. It took some time for me to become accustomed to it. I am satisfied
