Germans Swarming
To Holland Now

In Holland Now

It is treated to control Commerce

The Hague, August 29—Holland literally is swarming with Germans, and the German language is also as common in the streets, in trains, on tram cars, and in restaurants and hotels as the Dutch language. Many of these people come for a vacation and food, but the majority are men who are here for business and financial reasons, or to evade taxes. Germany, by losing the war, failed to annex the Netherlands, but now intends to control the country economically, and is streething out its tentacles over the whole of Holland like a large octopus.

In spite of the constant efforts of the

In spite of the constant efforts of the German government to control export capital, it continues to flow into Holland and other neutral countries, and many new companies and agencies are being started here.

The Dutch government in principle opposes this inundation of German subjects, especially owing to the fear of Bolshevism, and the aliens' office here exercises a vigorous control over passports. No foreigner can arrive or depart from Hol-
