MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Vital Bouchard, of Madawaska, Me., was killed yesterday near Edmundston, N. B., by being crushed beneath the wheels of a Temiscouata Railway express. Owing to the snow being piled several feet near a crossing he did not see the train coming and was driving across when he was struck and killed.

Two more newspapers are to appear in Montreal, one a weekly, "The Owl," independently owned, to fight for civic reform, the other a daily, the "Montreal Daily News," probably under the management of Edward Beck, who will delve into graft reports and line up against the Montreal Tramways Corporation.

The delay of the government in giving information on railway matters was strongly scored at Ottawa yesterday by Hon. H. R. Emmerson and Hon. G. F. Graham, the former referring particularly to the Bowditch-Gutelius agreement which had been promised in October last to a St. John delegation, but had not been forthcoming. Premier Borden promised to direct the attention of Hon. Mr. Cochrane to the matter.

In the British House of Lords yesterday, Lord Murray, in connection with the Marconi shares matter, made a confession of error in judgment, an unserved expression of regret, coupled with a disclaimer that there had been anything in his actions which reflected on the honor or integrity of the public life. He said he had made a mistake in investing Liberal party funds in Marconi shares, but had himself assumed the burden by taking over the shares.

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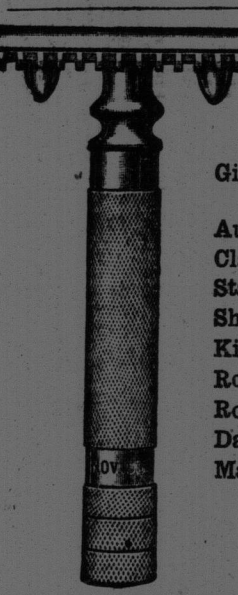

THE PAVING BILL

A Concise Summary of the Provisions of the Measure

To the Editor of The Times:
Sir,—As the citizens of St. John are becoming very much interested in the new paving act, and it appears to be not well understood, it may not be out of place to submit a summary of the act in language of a different nature, and including a few explanatory additions.

There are twenty-four sections in the act.

Sec. 1 gives the meaning of the word "street" as used in the act.

Sec. 2 confers upon the common council power to order the paving of any or all of the streets of the city.

Sec. 3 provides opportunity for property owners to take the initiative by petitioning for a pavement on any street one half of the frontage representation being necessary on the petition.

Sec. 4, 5, 6, 11, 12, 13, 14. The common council must then prepare plans, estimates, etc., and if approved of the work, proceed with the same, and collect from all of the property owners on the street in proportion to their frontages (regardless of depth) for one half of the total cost of the pavement, including space at intersecting streets.

Sec. 5. The payments by the property owners are to be spread over ten years, with interest on the total sum at five per cent per annum, but any owner may pay the whole assessment when made and escape the fifty per cent interest charge.

Sec. 6. The paving assessment is to be a lien on each property, taking precedence over mortgages.

Sec. 7.—The common council may take the initiative for the paving of any street where no petition has been presented for same, and must advertise the work and its approximate cost (not naming the kind of pavement proposed to be laid), and must submit the same to the council before proceeding to lay the pavement.

Sec. 8.—A petition against the paving of the street signed by owners representing sixty per cent of the total frontages (these frontages including those owned by the city) presented to the council within one month after the advertising referred to would prevent the laying of the pavement, and the council is to be charged on all of the tax-payers.

Sec. 9 provides, but not clearly, for deductions on account of obligation of the street railway company to maintain the pavements between the rails and to distances outside of the rails.

Sec. 10 provides in an indirect manner for making exceptions of Dock, Mill and Main streets, and of portions of Prince William, Charlotte and Union streets with respect to petitions from the property owners against the laying of the pavements on those streets, no petitions to be received by the common council against those pavements.

Sec. 11 provides for preventing flow of water on to the street by building of ing or premises, new or old, by rendering the owners liable to fine or imprisonment in all cases where a flow at present exists or in future may be created. No time is allowed for making changes.

Sec. 12 Continued. There is a suggestion made in this section of a method of disposing of the refuse, which is the carrying of the sidewalk and street and the laying of an underground pipe to the sewer. The City Engineer, City Manager and Customs House are examples of buildings delivering water on to the streets.

Sec. 13, 14, 15, 21 provide for giving the common council power to lay sidewalk covering of either stone, brick, concrete or asphalt on any or all of the sidewalks of the city, and to collect in one or more payments (in full or in part) a sum of not more than five per cent per annum to be paid from the property owners one half

Sec. 24 repeats the St. John Paving Act of 1907, but confirms all that may have been done under that Act, notwithstanding any defect or imperfection in the procedure for applying the said Act, and brings into operation the provisions in the new act in regard to assessments made under the 1907 act.
