NELLIE GILL PLAYERS AT OPERA HOUSE OPEN WITH SUCCESS

Paid in Full is Well Presented and Well Received. The Nellie Gill Players opened a ten days' engagement at the Opera House last night with the presentation of the drama Paid in Full. They were greeted by a large audience, and were given a gratifying reception. Since the play was produced in St. John several years ago it has become one of the greatest successes of recent years, and has had a run of two years in the Astor Theatre, New York. The theme, although simple, is of gripping interest and gives rise to several intensely dramatic situations. The chief merit of the play, however, has been the opportunity it gives for striking character delineations, and for the portrayal of the various emotions which are aroused to white heat during the progress of the incidents of the story.

The first scene shows the unhappy home life of Joe Brooks, who has become discouraged on account of his lack of ability to provide for his wife and children, which she has been accustomed. He weakly commits them to his employer's care as much to gratify his own vanity as through consideration of his wife's comfort. In the next act he is found, with his family, in a fashionable hotel to which they have moved, but the unexpected return of the employer, Captain Williams, and his fellow employer and friend, Jimmie Smith, brings about the discovery of his guilt. He confesses to his wife and in a burst of self pity puts the blame on her, and urges her to go to the captain to intercede for him. The captain is regarded as an extremely hard-hearted character, but with a weakness for women, and Brooks is convinced that the respect he has for the captain has shown towards his wife would make it possible for her to make a bargain with the employer. The nature of the bargain he does not leave her to doubt. Although expressing a bitter revulsion of her former affection for her husband, the wife decided to go rather than allow him to place the blame on her. In a strongly worked up scene in the captain's room, she intercedes for her husband, but when the captain, who has fully grasped the situation, gives her an opportunity to carry out her husband's plan and she refuses to do so, she is met with an expression of gratitude at finding one thoroughly good woman. In the last act the drama has a logical, although somewhat unconventional ending.

Miss Gill appeared in the role of the wife and played the part with ability and she was at her best in the heavier emotional scenes. Albert Hanna gave a convincing interpretation of the character of the weak husband and B. S. Deeks, in the role of the captain, proved one of the most popular members of the company. W. W. Henry had a pleasant role as the friend of the husband, and took full advantage of it. Miss Hilliard as her daughter-in-law, and Miss Morland as her daughter, also filled their roles acceptably. The play will be repeated tonight, and at both performances tomorrow.
