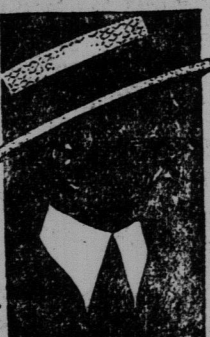

**THE EMPRESS STEAMERS**

### A RICH COPPER MINE NEAR SUSSEX

C. W. Ganong Interested — Declared There is No Doubt Now as to Wealth There

(Sussex Record.)  
A few years ago Gilbert W. Ganong of Ganong Bros., St. Stephen, took up mining rights on a square mile of territory near his birthplace, at Scotch Settlement. The claim was prospected and clear indications of rich copper deposit were found. Some work was done at the time, but it was not until several years later that Edward and Thad Dick, Charlotte county residents, became associated with Mr. Ganong. They came east and copper experts and for years have been interested in the rich deposits of Colorado and Nevada. They came east and after an examination of the property pronounced it as one of great future and soon after commenced its further development.

For several years the Dick brothers have been spending part of the year locating leads in the mining area, giving the balance of their time to their American holdings. Two or three years ago there was unearthed a quantity of ore that showed wonderful richness, and since then further investigations reveal that the mine is rich in copper than was dreamed of in the early days of its discovery. The ore is a chalcopryite, carrying other grades of copper and in junction with traces of gold and silver. It runs all the way from ten to eighteen per cent copper. When it is considered that many mines are being worked today, as paying propositions, which give a yield of from two to five per cent, it will be seen that the Kings County property is one which bids fair to make its mark in the mining world.

The work in connection with the mine has been carried on quietly but a lot of work has been done and during the present summer a number of leads of great size and exceptional richness have been hared. The property is now in such a shape that there is no doubt no doubt as to the wealth it contains. Not only are there enormous deposits of copper, but they are advantageously placed, and can be easily shipped over the Central railway, now controlled by the C. P. R., to smelting plants. The first shipments, it is understood, will be made to Jersey City in the near future. On the results of these tests will depend the future of the property, but at this stage it looks as if a great industry will shortly be opened up in this county. Disinterested experts who have been over the property pronounce it to be a bonanza.

### BORING FOR GAS AT SUSSEX

Sussex Record—Dr. Henderson, president of the Maritime Oilfields Limited and the company's expert. Mr. Boggs arrived here on Monday to take a final look over the ground before starting operations on the properties on which they have secured the right to bore for gas. The company have been particularly busy since the opening of spring and are doing more work in New Brunswick than at any time since they started business.  
In Albert they have four sets of working tools going and they have a fifth to start work with here. The plants now being employed are of the most modern make and they do their work rapidly and effectively. As a result of the visit, the first well has been located. While neither cares to discuss the possibilities of the situation, they are hopeful that Sussex will soon be in a position to enjoy the boom of natural gas.

### Clergymen Returning.

### MATRON FOR THE POLICE COURT

One May Be Appointed For There But Not For County Jail

Again there has been some talk of the appointment of a matron for the county jail, but the committee of the county council which looked into the matter has decided that there is little need for such an official. Nearly all the family prisoners brought before the court are promptly dealt with and most of those who are sentenced to imprisonment are cared for in the Home of the Good Shepherd or in the Evangelical Home. Only a few reach the jail and these are usually hardened offenders who, the committee believe, do not justify the appointment of a matron.

The county councillors recognize, however, the need for a matron for the police court, where all female prisoners are taken at first, no matter what disposition of them is made later and they would be quite willing for the city to appoint, and pay for a matron for this institution.
