### SYDNEY STREET TO BE ALL OPEN FOR TRAFFIC TOMORROW

Now Have Pavement That Should Last Twenty-five or Thirty

The work on the street pavement on the east side of King Square will be completed tomorrow and the street will be open to traffic with a permanent roadbed guaranteed to last twenty-five years. The work in this particular street has been more than usually difficult, as the whole hill is a ledge of rock which had to be smoothed with picks before the constructive work could be begun. The process of laying the new roadway is a comparatively simple one. After the rock bottom has been leveled roughly a layer of concrete six inches thick is laid. Over this is spread an inch and a half of sand. Then the granite blocks, about nine inches long and five thick, are laid down, with a space the surfaces of each. In the space so left grout, consisting of sand and concrete, is poured and this makes the whole a solid mass with enough roughness on the surface, however, to give the horses good foothold.


