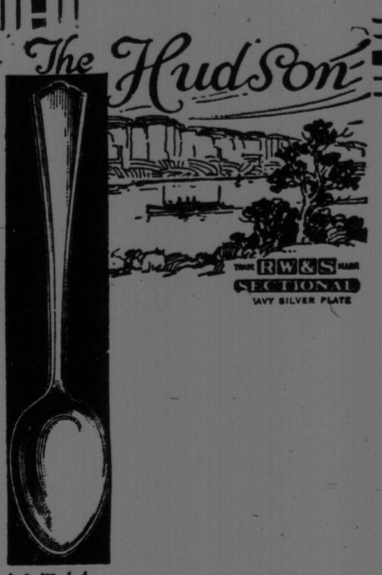

GRAIN CONVEYORS WILL BE PROVIDED AT SAND POINT FOR NEXT WINTER'S BUSINESS, ANNOUNCEMENT TODAY

Word to Board of Trade from Public Works Minister is Confirmed by Alex. Gray, Resident Engineer—Cost About \$125,000.

That additional grain conveyors would be provided for the coming winter season at this port was the cheering word made public this morning through the Board of Trade and Alex. Gray, resident engineer of the Public Works Department.

BYRON C. TAPLEY CLOSE TO DEATH

Former St. John Man in a Runaway Trolley in New York Crash.

From letters to friends in this city it is learned that Byron C. Tapley, formerly of St. John, and for the last two years a resident of New York city, was one of the victims in a runaway trolley collision which occurred on May 14, on the viaduct at 153rd street, New York.

Mr. Tapley was cut and bruised in twenty places. He writes that he has effected a satisfactory settlement with the company.

Had the car left the rails on the viaduct, which is five stories in height, it would have meant sure death. The track curves like the letter S at the bridge before crossing, so that had the Crosstown car not been there, it was certain that the Ogdon car would have left the rails and smashed into the girders of the bridge or been dumped into the Harlem river.

GARDINER GETS 6 MONTH SENTENCE

In the County Court this morning Frank C. Gardiner was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary for breaking into the store of Alice Taylor at East St. John. W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution and W. R. Ross for the defence.

SUGAR DROPS 40 CENTS IN 2 DAYS

A reduction of 15 cents a hundred pounds in all grades of refined sugar, which went into effect on Wednesday, was followed by another cut of 25 cents a hundred last evening, bringing the St. John wholesale rate down to 88.10 a hundred pounds for granulated.

"Hiram," said the Times reporter to Mr. Hiram Hornbeam, "I observed a lady dressed in blue last evening with a blue walking stick."

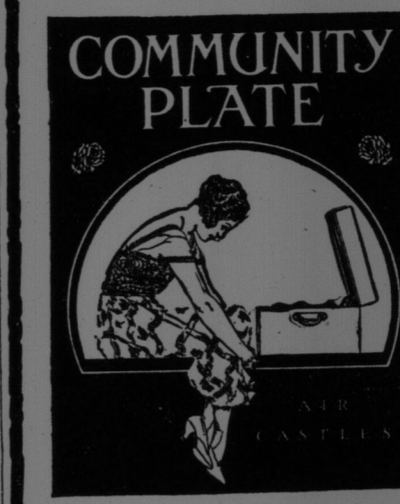
"Did she talk to you?" queried Hiram. "I was not so favored," said the reporter.

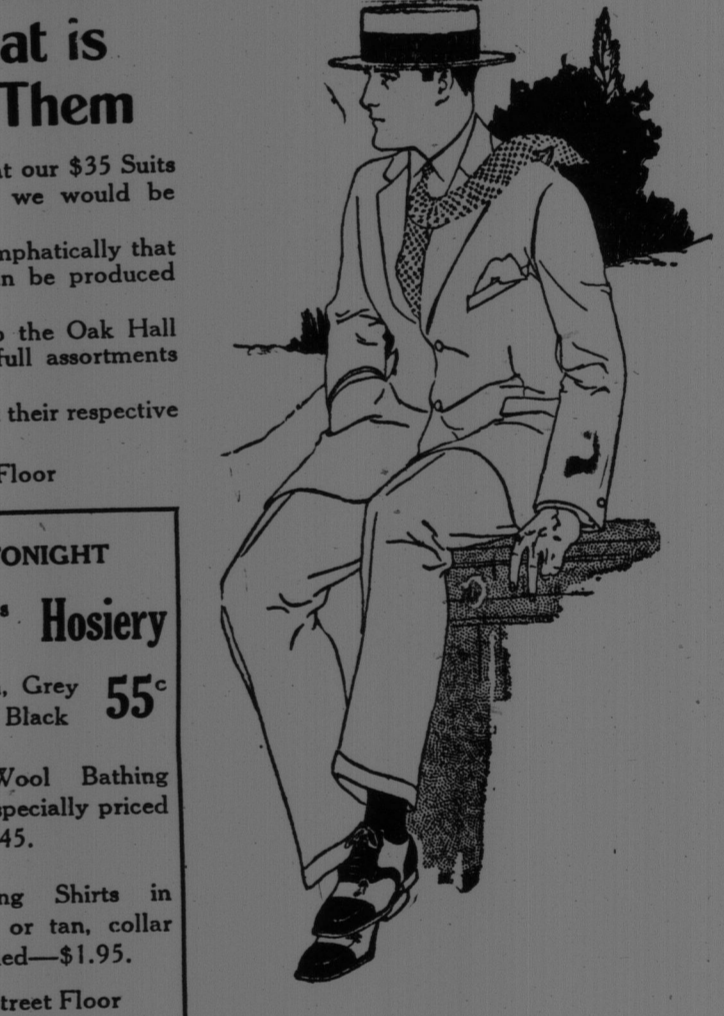

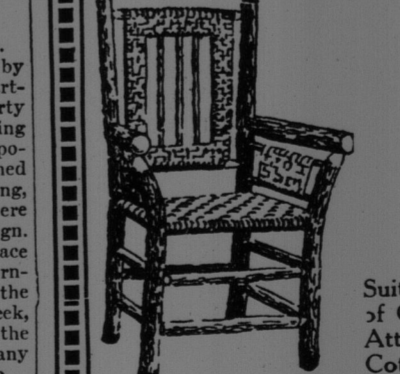
