

# COURT UPHOLDS STORE'S RIGHT TO SHOPPER'S NAME

Competitor May Obtain "Jane Ware's" Services, Not Good-will - Injunction Permanent.

When a store builds a personal shopping service around a specific name, no other store in the same community is allowed to use the same name. The allowed to use the same name. The right of one store to restrain others from so doing was upheld by District Judge W. M. Walker of Ottumwa, Ia., who granted a temporary and then a permanent injunction restraining the W. J. Donelan Company department store from using the name "Jane Ware" claimed by the S. C. Cullen Company as its "Shopping Service" designation.
