HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even-numbered section of Doinion Lands in Manitoba, Sasketch mmion Lands in Manicola, Saske en-ewan and Alberta. excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or

quarter section of 164 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situate. Entry by proxy may, however, be made any Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

Duties.—(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

The steamer left Haileybury at 8 in the morning with passengers and freight for Temiskaming Station, 38 miles north of Mattawa.

About twenty-five persons were on board, including three women, the cook and two waitresses. Most of the passengers were men from the lumber camps. As the chill of the northern evening settled down on the lake the passengers gathered in the centre of the boat close to the boilers, which accounts for the number scalded.

Within four miles of the steamer's destination an explosion occurred, followed by a rush of hot, scalding steam to all parts of the boat, filling the cabins, which were closed in.

Instantly all was confusion. Mingled with the roar of escaping steam rose the frightful cries of the injured, while the pussengers rushed blindly to and fro in the clouds of steam which obscured everything.

Capt. L. E. Jones was in the wheelhouse and immediately threw the wheel and headed the ill-fated boat for the shore, which, fortunately, afforded an ideal place to beach the craft, which was under sufficient headway to reach the shore.

As soon as the nose of the boat run upon the bank those who were able scrambled ashore, with the exception of Capt. Jones, J. A. Larochelle, managing director of the Temiskaming Navigation Co., and one or two more, who remained behind to rescue the injured. Mrs. Keenan, the cook, and two waitresses were imprisoned in the after cabin and were dragged out of

the hurricane deck, and thence to the shore. When the accident happened, J. Mc-bride of Columbus, O.; A. Hunter and C.\*Ryan of Ottawa jumped into the lake and began to swim to shore. Capt. Jones, Mr. Larochelle and two pessengers placed the injured in two lifeboats and rowed to Temiskaming Landing, four miles away, while those able walked.

Ryan, with the flesh hanging in strips from his legs, walked the entire distance. At Temiskaming the injured, who were all suffering from burns and scalds, were bandaged up after the wounds were covered with lard, which was the only available material for temporary relief.
