H. B. Schofield of this city, J. D. Allian of Halifax and A. E. Jones of Toronto, representatives of the Canadian Board of Trade, arrived here this morning on the steamer Olenda from the West Indies, where they went for the purpose of looking into trade conditions and the relations existing between Canada and the West Indies. Messrs. Allan and Jones left for their homes today. Mr. Schofield was seen by a Star representative shortly after his arrival. He spoke enthusiastically of his trip. He said: "We received fine receptions wherever we went. The sentiment was found to be strongly in favor of a larger trade with Canada. The people seem willing to remove the obstacles now standing between Canada and the West Indies regarding an increase in the trade. It now largely rests with Canadians to develop business." Mr. Schofield states that he and the other two delegates talked strongly with the West Indian boards, urging them to give Canada a preference. Two messages were received this morning by Mr. Edwin Peters, of Gernain street, from Somerville, N. J., the second one announcing the death of Mr. H. Reports received since then were to the effect that Mr. Smith was gradually improving and no serious termination to his illness was looked for.
