OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—Two Mattawa men who came to Ottawa last week to show Sir Wilfrid Laurier a work of woodmen's art in the shape of hand carving had the unfortunate experience of being jailed in Hull for a few hours owng to the suspicions aroused when they attempted to pass a cheque for \$25 bearing the premier signature. The two shanty men by name Lecompte and Nault, were kindly received by the premier who proved himself a true patron of art by giving them a cheque for \$25 in exchange for the result of their long hours of labor as self taught wood carvers, but when they came to cash the cheque at a Hull butcher store, the police were communicated with and the innocent neophytes in art were locked up on the charge of forging the name of the prime minister to the cheque Explanations follows:
