GALLANT RESCUE.

Of the Crew of a Sinking British Steamer.

NEW YORK, Jan 1.-The American line steamer Paris, which arrived today, contains British crew members who were rescued from a sinking British steamer on Tuesday, Dec 27, lat. 42.28 north and lon. 31.29 west, at 8.30 in the morning, she sighted a steamer flying signals of distress. On bearing down to her she proved to be the British tank steamer Vinograd, Captain Clarke, from Rouen Dec. 15 for Philadelphia. She showed the signal letters "N. D.", meaning "Must abandon vessel." A life boat was launched in charge of Chief Officer Bradshaw, Fourth Officer Webb and eight seamen. A dangerous sea was running at the time, and a heavy cheer was given the life savers as they left the side of the Paris. The boat was unable to go alongside the Vinograd, owing to the heavy sea, but the Vinograd's crew were fastened to lines thrown to the boat and were hauled on board. The ships parted unfortunately at 10.30, and the line fastened to him and was lost. Although the distance between the two steamers was not great it took two and a half hours to rescue the men and land them on board the Paris.

WILLIAM HAS THE GRIP.

BERLIN, Jan 1.-Emperor William, who is confined to his bed by an attack of influenza, was unable to attend the reception at the palace by Prince Frederick Leopold and the Imperial Crown Prince Frederick, on Wednesday, Dec 30. The Emperor was largely attended by the public, marked the debut of the crown prince.

PORTLAND'S WINTER TRADE.

(Portland Press, Thursday.) Several big transatlantic liners were in port at one time yesterday. This made a net tonnage aggregating over 28,000 tons. There were four steamers in one dock, something never seen here before, and one big ship forced to lie out in the stream for want of docking room. Up to this point there has been altogether twenty-four steamers here since the middle of November. This is a record for this time of year. The Grand Trunk railroad is taxing the capacity of its single track to the utmost to bring in the immense amount of freight which it requires to load these big ships. There were over 400 car loads of Lodon merchandise along in the yards Tuesday.

SNOW LOCOMOTIVE.

Alderman George Waring intends going to the province of Quebec next week to erect and drive into the woods a novel machine for hauling logs on the snow by steam power. The machine he is starting this new method of hauling logs in the woods. The weight of the machine is upwards of twenty tons. "JACK THE RIPPER."

The French Monster Gullitoned for His Crimes-He Surpassed in Atrocity the Whitechapel Murderer in London. PARIS, Dec 31.-Jos. Vacher, the French "Jack the Ripper," was gullitoned at Bourg-Bresse, capital of the department of Ain, this morning. He protested his innocence to the last. Vacher, who was 39 years of age, was condemned at the October assizes at Ain. He is known to have brutally murdered four boys, six women and girls, and an old widow. Most of the victims were tender hearts when Vacher came behind them and cut their throats. The crimes of Jos. Vacher have surpassed in this respect any other of the Whitechapel murders. His homicidal mania first broke out seriously in 1884. He claimed after his arrest that as every action has an object, and his motive was neither theft nor vengeance, his responsibility was established. Physiologists, physicians have regarded the case interesting. It was shown that Vacher had a morbid tendency to the insane, and that while doing military duty a love affair caused him to attempt self-destruction by shooting. The victims of Vacher were shepherds and shepherdesses and his rage was particularly directed against the latter. He first cut the throat of his victims with a knife and afterwards mutilated them with a razor. He was arrested last year after the police had searched for him for a long time in vain. In defence of Vacher it was pointed out that when a youth he was bitten by a mad dog and that the village hebbard gave him some medicine, after drinking which he became strange, irritable and brutal. It also appears from those statements that from time to time he developed a passion for human blood.

Too many frozen fowl and chickens were rubbed on the market for holiday trade, with the result that prices, under stress of stock and weather, went away down. There were sales of this stock last week as low as 19 to 20c per pair. On Saturday there were still cases of them unopened. Fresh and unfrozen stock sold better. As high as 15c was paid retail for turkeys on Saturday, but they were scarce and fresh. It is a mistake to load the market with fowl and chickens at this season. In other lines, eggs are easier, and best grades of potatoes are firmer. Lamb is easier. The market is well supplied in all lines.
