The Edmundston scored with particularity well in the second period getting the ball out clearly and consistently and making good gains by dribbling. The work of the quarter line was also good. They ran, passed and tackled well.

Reardon of the Woodstock team was the outstanding player on the field. McCreedy, Hierly and Hutton showed up well on the Edmundston as did Augherton and Buck on the Woodstock Team.

Both teams showed a lack of condition, but with more practice and training will put up good games.

AT THE HEAD OF ELECTRICAL DEPT.

FREDERIC STEVENS INJURED IN PAPER MILL

Mr. Fred Stevens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stevens, suffered a painful injury to his right hand in the Fraser Paper Mill at Madawaska, Me., on Monday.

He is employed as a fifth hand on a paper machine. The paper on the stacking rolls appeared to be sticking and he took hold of it in an endeavor to pull it back. While he was doing so his hand was pulled between the rolls and the ends of his fingers were crushed badly. Two fingers nails and part of another were torn off, but unless there are complications it will not be necessary to make any further amputations.

LOCAL POLICE DOES QUICK WORK

Car belonging to Sherman Murphy Stolen — Recovered at Montmagny.

A Hudson Sedan belonging to Sherman Murphy was stolen in front of his residence on St. Francis Street on Thursday evening. Chief of Police Savage immediately got in touch with the police authorities along the road to Montreal and on Sunday the car was located in a garage at Montmagny P. Q.; later in the day Claude Ouellette of Edmundston and Martin Theriault of Berlin, N. H., were arrested at Charney. They were brought back to Edmundston and on Wednesday morning appeared before Magistrate Hubert and were charged with stealing the car. They elected to be tried by the magistrate, pleaded guilty to the charges and were remanded for sentence.

Ouellette has a police record, having spent a year in a reform school in Maine; also about two years and a half ago while in Edmundston goal awaiting trial on a charge of having stolen a car he escaped. He is twenty years old.

Theriault has no police record as far as can be ascertained and has been in Canada only about fifteen days.

FIRE CAUSES HEAVY LOSS

Two Barns Belonging to Maxime Guérette Burn.

Two large barns near the Town Limits on the south west side of the Madawaska River belonging to Maxime Guérette were burned on Saturday morning.

Mr. Guérette deals in horses and it is thought that one of the men who had been at the barns to see the horses dropped a match in the hay and started the fire. The alarm was rung in at about 11.30 in the morning, but by the time the fire department arrived all hope of saving the barns was gone and the firemen confined their efforts to controlling the fire so that it would not reach surrounding buildings. Considerable hay was burned and also a Chevrolet Coupe belonging to Mr. Guérette. When the fire reached the car the gasoline caused a large explosion.

T. J. SCOTT WINS GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeats H. M. Grady in semi-finals and F. O. White in final.

The play for the Smiley Cup emblematic of the mens' Championship of the Edmundston Golf Club was completed over the week end, and resulted in Mr. T. J. Scott, local manager of The Royal Bank of Canada, being the winner.

In the semi finals Mr. Scott played H. M. Grady, defeating him two up and one to go. Mr. Grady was one up at the end of the first nine holes, but at the end of the seventh hole on the was on the green in two and holed out second round Mr. Scott was one up. In the final the champion met Mr. F. O. White. According to the rules set by the donor of the cup it is necessary to play a match of 36 holes in the final. It was necessary to play only four holes of the fourth round as each player won two of these holes. The match ended at the thirty-first hole as at that stage Mr. Scott was 6 up with 5 to go. He played the first two rounds in 84 and the third in 84.

The cup was won last year by Mr. Robert Hunter who did not compete this year as he no longer resides in the Town.
