Common Council
Meeting Yesterday

Proposal to Purchase Buildings Adjoining City Hall Rejected—New Building Talked Of—Other Business Transacted.

The regular meeting of the Common Council was held yesterday morning. Commissioner Frink moved that a bill be prepared and submitted to the Legislature governing the laying of gas mains and conduits by the New Brunswick Power Company, and conduits by the N. B. Telephone Co. in streets which are about to be paved, and that it be compulsory with the companies using streets or roads in St. John to provide and lay such mains under the direction of the city engineer.

A resolution was also passed regarding the installation of sewer and water to vacant lots in Douglas avenue.

A motion of Commissioner Frink that Mayor Schofield be authorized to negotiate with W. M. Jarvis and the owners of the Bank of Nova Scotia building, adjoining City Hall, for the purpose of acquiring these buildings for civic purposes was lost.

The following recommendations were passed:

That the comptroller be authorized to pass for payment the account of Gilbert Murdoch, \$1,043.04 for services surveying city timber lands.

That the commissioner of water and sewerage be empowered to lay a ten-inch main along the old Westmorland road from Egbert street to within 144 feet of Brussels street at an estimated cost of \$5,500 the outlay to be provided for out of maintenance account.

That the following accounts be paid: Fred Doyle and Son, diving, \$1,200.00; Union Light-Landown given by city to officers of H. M. S. Calcutta, 213.30; D. A. Fox-Orchestra, H. M. S. Calcutta, 35.00; St. John Globe—Menu cards, 43.61.

That James H. Frink, commissioner of public works, be chosen as a delegate to represent the city, or his worship the Mayor, at the annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities on July 27, 28 and 29.

That the matter of providing a right of way from the Shamrock grounds, be left with His Worship the Mayor and the Commissioner of Public Works and Road Engineer with power to act.

That the Premier of New Brunswick be requested to name a day when the executive of the province will meet in St. John on which the members of the Common Council may be granted a hearing in the matter of resolution adopted by this council on the 16th day of December last, requesting the government to pay over annually to the city 50 per cent of the revenue collected in the city of St. John from moving picture houses and from owners of automobiles as well as from fines collected by the police court under the Prohibition Act.

On motion of Commissioner Thornton W. Pirie and Son were granted permission to install a gasoline tank on their premises in Sydney street.

Commissioner Bullock moved that a tender of the Worthington Pump and Machinery Company for a section of an air and water pump for use on the steamer Governor Carleton be accepted. The price submitted was \$1,100.

A contract for painting No. 4 Engine House was given to W. E. Desha, whose tender was \$250.

Commissioner Jones then brought up the matter of installing sewer and water connections to ninety-five vacant lots in Douglas Avenue and presented the following resolution, which was passed:

Whereas the Common Council having by resolution ordered paving to be done on Douglas Avenue at an early date;

And whereas there are at the present time a number of vacant lots along that thoroughfare without sewerage and water service;

And whereas it is desirable that all vacant lots should be provided with these facilities in advance of the putting down of the pavement;

Be it therefore resolved that the Commissioner of Water and Sewerage be instructed to direct the attention of the owners or agents of said vacant lands to Section No. 43 of the Act relating to Sewerage and Water supply in the city of St. John.

Commissioner Frink then made a motion that the mayor be authorized to negotiate for the purchase of the two buildings adjoining city hall in Prince William street. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Jones.

After discussion Commissioner Bullock moved in amendment that no action be taken. This defeated the original motion. Mayor Schofield and Commissioner Thornton and Bullock voted for the amendment and Commissioners Frink and Jones for the motion.

The Preliminary
Hearing Yesterday

Beverly, Kennedy, Wilkinson, Currie, Dean and Ross before Court in Hampton for Death of Virginia Garrett—Case Continues Next Tuesday.

The preliminary hearing in a manslaughter charge brought against Harold Beverly, John Kennedy, Jack Wilkinson, Allan Currie, John Dean and Charles Ross for the death of Virginia Garrett at Reaford on the 29th of April, was resumed before Stipendiary Magistrate P. W. F. Brewster at Hampton yesterday. Several witnesses for the prosecution gave evidence, and the case was adjourned to next Tuesday at 9.30, Standard time.

Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., appeared for the prosecution, and George W. Fowler for the defence. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., who is also counsel for the defence, was not present at yesterday's hearing.

Benjamin Dennison, the first witness called, stated that he was in Colby's store on the night of April 29, when he suddenly heard a crash and saw a quantity of goods fall from the shelves. He ran outside and saw John Dean lying unconscious on the platform. Then someone came along with the little Garrett girl, and laid her on the platform. She was bleeding at the mouth and scarcely breathing.

The witness which hit the shop went into the ditch on the side nearest Hampton, and lay over the culvert. Another car was stopped on the other side of the road about opposite the store. A short while after the accident witness examined the tracks of the wrecked car. They started about 200 feet from the store and were fairly straight; they were off the road, an agot further off as they neared the store. The other car was on the main road and left no tracks.

Cross-examined by Mr. Fowler, witness said that the platform in front of the store was three feet wide, and the asphalt about eight feet from the store. The old road was against the platform. The asphalt track was fourteen feet wide.

George Colby, proprietor of the store, gave evidence similar to the first witness. He also said that on coming out of his shop, the first he saw was little Margaret Garrett; she was face down and crying. Ada Puley came around the corner of the store and asked where Virginia was. Witness started to look for her, and saw a young man lying unconscious on the bank about nine feet from the road and near the culvert.

Harry Morton flashed a light, and witness saw Virginia lying in the bottom of the ditch. She was bleeding and breathing faintly.

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BRITISH WOMEN FAR
IN EXCESS OF MEN

Walking down the Strand recently a newspaper reporter counted 200 women to fifty-eight men in the space of a quarter of an hour, while the proportion in a tube carriage was twenty-two women to six men, says Pearson's Weekly.

As we are all aware, we have now an enormously greater number of women than of men in these islands. Even before the war English women outnumbered English men by nearly a million. Today the difference is about two millions.

Some people declare that there is nothing to be done to remedy this state of affairs. Why not? There are heaps of countries which want women. Our own Dominions in particular. The Western Australia, in that great country there are three men to two women. There is not a single Australian state where men do outnumber women. For the whole of the island continent 200,000 women are required to make the sexes equal.

Matters are not quite so bad in Canada, but even there 130,000 women are required to even up matters. Smaller dependencies are in a worse way. The Falkland Islands, for instance, have 1,200 men to only 800 women. Trinidad has 136,000 men to 119,000 women.

British Guiana is short of women; so are the beautiful Seychelles Islands. As for Hong Kong, that great metropolis of the East, it has 5,000 men to 3,000 women.

The fact is that in almost every part of the British Empire, except in Britain itself, there are more men than women. There is no other country in the world which has so great a preponderance of women as has England today. Surely emigration is the best, indeed the only cure for the present state of affairs.

A. Wilson, the president, gave a most interesting account of the recent annual meeting of the National Council held at St. John.
