Mayor and Sheriff There.

Mayor White and Sheriff Ritchie occupied seats beside the judge. The Morning Evidence.

Joseph Doherty, father of the murdered youth repeated his evidence given at the coroner's inquest. 'Higgins first said he saw my boy about 10 o'clock Friday morning and then reversed and said he saw him going with my dinner kettle. This was on Union street, that I was talking to Higgins and Alexander told me that they heard my son went to Springhil."
