Montreal, Sept. 28.—David Russell, the plaintiff in the suit for \$250,000 against the Pinkerton Detective Agency, and his brother, John Russell, Jr., of St. John, were the chief witnesses today, and each gave sensational testimony. John Russell made clear the part he played in the plan to have his brother confined in a sanitarium and told how he quickly retired when he learned the facts.
