"Slow" as an adverb has been in lit-

erature since the year 1500. It is found in Byron, Thackeray and the Edin-burgh Review. Johnson's Dictionary of 1773 quotes numerous examples of its use by Donne, Milton and Pope. It seems as if it ought to be especially suitable in an automobile warning sign. For cannot old fashioned people (not "purifiers") remember the couplet in

Marmion?

And come he slow or come he fast It is but death who comes at last. The English language will continue to be a noble and forceful means of expressing thought if it remains proof against new and unheard of rules altering ancient usage. In other words, let us investigate and "go slow" before condemning a word just because it is encountered for the first time.—Brooklyn Standard Union.
