
AUSTRIA RECOGNISES HUNGARIAN SOVIET.

OTTAWA Mar. 29—It is probable that a special meeting of the Ottawa city council will be called tomorrow to discuss the question of municipal daylight saving. Notice of a motion to enact it has already been given by Ald. McKinley. The impression here is that if presented to the council (which would not ordinarily meet for another fortnight) daylight saving will be adopted by the city and will become effective on April 1st. Last year's experiment was particularly satisfactory to the capital and civil servants were particularly benefited by it.
