BELA KUN'S STATEMENT OF HUNGARY'S STAND

Austria Gives Recognition to Soviet Government.

WANTS GOOD RELATIONS WITH ALLIES.
BUDAPEST, March 28. (By Ed ward Bing).—"We are ready to continue peaceful and friendly relations with the Allies if possible but we will fight to defend our just interests," Bela Kun, foreign minister of the Hungarian soviet government, declared in a statement to foreign correspond ents today.
Count Karolyi, former premier, who turned the country over to the communists, reiterated in an interview his statement that the Entente's imperialism was responsible for the change of government in Hungary. "I will continue to work for the sacred cause of saving my country, with less responsibility, but with more energy," he said.

AUSTRIA RECOGNIZES HUNGARIAN SOVIET.
The Austrian cabinet decided yesterday to recognize the Hungarian soviet government, according to an official dispatch received from Vienna today. M. Belgrai and F. E. Noyes have been accredited as representatives of the new Hungarian government in Vienna. The latter was formerly a lecturer on sociology in Clark University, Worcester, Mass.

Budapest continued peaceful last night. The street traffic was un disturbed. Reports from the province indicate that communism was organized quietly throughout the Hungarian territory unopposed by the Allies, under the direction of local soviet. Some

BELIEVED TO HAVE NIPPED PLOT.
LONDON, March 28.—Action by American troops in looking after Russian prisoners in Germany is believed to have nipped in bud an important bolshevik plot, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Berlin.

LENINE WOULD SEND ARMY TO VIENNA.

The arguments for the highway were of a high order and he was not unduly surprised by the government, to seriously consider the request.

Ald. C. Grob also said that the deputation were well received by Premier Heaton and the other cabinet ministers. The deputation after the conference is hopeful that it will bear fruit, he stated.

Found Dead in Bed This Morning

Mr. Samuel Badke Suddenly Called.
There was suddenly called to his eternal rest early this morning, Mr. Samuel Badke, 143 Edward street, who was found dead in bed. He passed away sometime during the night, although he had been in ill health, good health, when he retired. Death was due to heart failure.

Mr. Badke was eighty-one years of age and had been one of the oldest residents in the city. He was born in Germany but came here many years ago. He lived here or over six years and was therefore one of the pioneer citizens. It is interesting to note that he came over to this country at the same time that the late J. H. Heller, sr., and other well known deceased old residents arrived. He also was one of those who assisted in the building of the Galt branch of the G.T.R.

Surviving him are his second wife and five children, who are Gustav, city; Edward of Trancona, Man.; Lizzie, Los Angeles, Calif.; Tillie at home, Mrs. W. Hoeh, city.

The deceased was a member of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church. The funeral will be held on Monday afternoon. After services at the residence interment will follow in Mount Hope Cemetery.

The community mourns the loss of a citizen of the sterling worth of the deceased, who by his exemplary life and thrift was an asset to the city. The citizens feel the loss of Mr. Badke and will sympathize with the bereaved family.

Ottawa is in Line For Daylight Saving

IF ADOPTED THERE M.P.'S WOULD HAVE TO TAKE THEIR OWN MEDICINE
OTTAWA, Mar. 29.—It is probable that a special meeting of the Ottawa city council will be called tomorrow to discuss the question of municipal daylight saving. Notice of a motion to enact it has already been given by Ald. McKinley. The impression here is that if presented to the council (which would not ordinarily meet for another fortnight) daylight saving will be adopted by the city and will become effective on April 1st. Last year's experiment was particularly satisfactory to the capital and civil servants were particularly benefited by it. Should it pass, then parliament, which yesterday voted against a federal law will be placed in the anomalous position of being forced to accept the time which they rejected or of going without their meals.

Negotiations to be Opened

G.T.R. AND ITS CLAIMS.
OTTAWA, Ont., March 28.—It is stated today that the negotiations between the Government and the Grand Trunk, which were broken off because an agreement could not be reached, will be resumed.

It is the desire of the government that some basis of agreement be reached between it and the Grand Trunk company whereby the Grand Trunk Pacific problem may be solved without the government having recourse to liquidation proceedings.

In the meantime the question appears to be pretty well in suspense. It is understood that the Grand Trunk is inclined to take the view at the present time that the action of the government in placing the Grand Trunk Pacific in the hands of receiver without the company having been in default has relieved the Grand Trunk of its obligations with respect to the Grand Trunk Pacific.

It is further understood that the Grand Trunk poses as a creditor in respect of the twenty-four millions of advances made by it to the Grand Trunk Pacific and its branch lines company. It is with the purpose of endeavoring to clear up the question that the government is prepared to reopen negotiations with the Grand Trunk.

Light Being Thrown on Russian Situation

Conservative Wing of Radicals Gaining Ascendancy
PEACE CONFERENCE TO DEAL WITH BOLSHIEVISM.
PARIS, March 28. (By Fred S. Ferguson).—Russia is again taking a prominent place in the peace discussion, it developed today. Though the Russian situation has recently appeared its present injection is believed to be more important and significant than any time heretofore.

There seems to be a possibility that the near future will see the framing of a Russian policy, something the peace conference has not had since its inception, and lack of which has been a constant source of embarrassment in considering dealings with Germany.

William E. Bullitt, special investigator for the American delegation, is expected to have brought back from Russia the best picture of actual conditions that has come out of that country in months. He is said to have found a surprising state of organization in the interior, compared with reports that have been received. The more conservative wing of the Russian radicals is said to be gaining control and stabilizing the general situation. As an instance of the order prevailing in the interior, trains are running on regular schedule leaving and arriving on the minute between Petrograd and Moscow. Peasants having gained the land are understood to be joining the more conservative elements. Bullitt spent a week in Petrograd without being endangered, traveling there from Moscow.

He has made informal report for presentation to the conference. He has no authority to negotiate, acting merely as an observer. His report, however, will have the greatest bearing on developments and sentiment is rapidly swinging back to the idea expressed early in the conference that world peace is impossible without dealing with the Bolshevik in some way.

Hungarian Soviet is Taking Drastic Measure

FEARFUL BECAUSE BOLSHIEVISM IS NOT SENDING MILITARY AID.
PARIS, March 28. (By John De Gandy).—News received from Budapest today via Switzerland, indicates the Hungarian soviet government, fearful of being cut off from the Russians without help, is taking drastic measures to safeguard its position. The Hungarian food commissioner is reported to have declared a meatless week started yesterday. Transgressors are said to have been threatened with the most severe penalties.

The socialization commissioner is understood to have decreed the immediate closing of all shops except food, drug, tobacco and stationary stores. Any infractions of this decree, according to dispatches, will be punishable by death.

Official circles in Hungary are said to be deeply disappointed over the failure of the Russian soviet to send immediate military aid. Several reports have been received that Russian bolshevik forces are successfully invading Galicia for the purpose of establishing communication between Moscow and Budapest.

A traveller arriving in Pressburg, which is reported to have been occupied by Italian troops, declared that before Colonel Vix of the French army was arrested in Budapest, his home was besieged and that all entente flags were torn to pieces. The Czech legation has been occupied, the traveller said, and official documents have been seized from allied couriers.

ROAD UNDOUBTEDLY WILL BE BUILT.

Lenine Wants Hungary to Attack Vienna

Offered to Finance an Army for the Purpose

COMMUNISM GROWS IN GERMANY.
BERLIN, March 27. (By Frank J. Taylor).—Premier Lenine has wirelessed the Hungarian soviet government, urging that it send a bolshevik army against Vienna, according to a dispatch received from Budapest today. He is said to have promised to finance a Hungarian expedition against Austria to the extent of \$20,000,000.

Discovering that Spartans planned to arm several thousand Russian in Ruhleben prison tomorrow, Americans rushed the prisoners aboard trains last night and are scattering them in other prison camps throughout Germany in charge of Americans. This action is believed to have nipped a bolshevik plot to follow Hungary in declaring a soviet republic.

Spartans in Spandau (nine miles west of Berlin), who had been threatening to revolt, took no action following the removal of the Russians. Radicals in other parts of Germany have begun to take matters into their own hands.

In Wurttemberg they have declared a general strike to force the government to accept the socialization of industries. Leipzig is said to be under the dictatorship of five communists. The Bavarian government has ordered factories in that state to begin production on a communistic basis. Soviets in Saxony have ordered the factories

Bolshevik Penetrating Eastern Galicia

OCCUPY IMPORTANT OIL LANDS

BERNE, March 28.—Russian bolshevik forces, penetrating eastern Galicia, are advancing so rapidly that Austria is threatened, according to advices received here today.

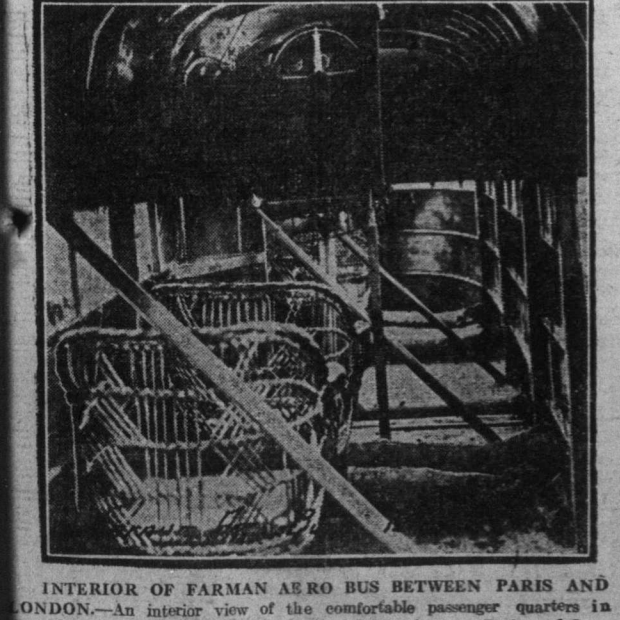
The important oil region of Galicia is said to have been completely occupied.

RAILROAD STRIKE HAS CAUSED IT.
VIENNA, March 28.—A railroad strike has been called and threatens to prevent all roads in this country. The strike was called partly for higher wages and partly because of sympathy with the Hungarian revolution. It is feared it may lead to the establishment of a soviet republic in German Austria.

The trouble began last night when men employed by the southern rail road walked out. All traffic on this road is at a complete standstill, even allied food trains from Trieste being stopped.

As a result of this interruption of transportation of supplies, Vienna is threatened with famine. The situation is considered extremely grave.

WHAT OFFICERS TESTIFIED

RHYL, Wale, March 28.—Evidence that drink was the aggravating cause in Kinnel Park on March 5th, when 5 Canadian soldiers were killed was submitted today at the coroner's inquest, by Major Collier. Another witness, Captain Scott, stated that the Russian element in camp was responsible for the rioting as well as the drink. Testimony from soldiers, who saw the rioters firing ball cartridges and from officers who swore that no order was given the men opposing rioters to use ball ammunition, of their bayonets, was also taken.

CITIES & TOWNS TO ADOPT DAYLIGHT SAVING BYLAWS

SEVERAL HAVE ALREADY ARRANGED TO DO SO
TORONTO, Mar. 28.—Judging from reports received from nearly all parts of Canada this morning, following the rejection last night by the Dominion parliament of the summer daylight saving scheme the larger cities and principal industries in the country will be run this summer, on the time fixed one hour ahead of the rural districts and the agricultural communities.

Several cities have already arranged to set their clocks ahead at 2 a.m. next Sunday morning, and others will do so as soon as necessary. Bylaws can be passed by the municipal councils.

Montreal, manufacturers and traders interests are meeting the civic administration this afternoon to advocate local daylight saving in that city.

The Toronto city council meets on Monday and is almost sure to pass a local by-law. The fact that railway shipping and telegraph companies will run on the new time has compelled many other concerns to announce their adoption of the same, notwithstanding the action of legislative bodies.

It is not thought here that the Dominion government or the parliament of Canada will exercise its control over the railway war board to compel railways to keep to the old time. The sentiment in cities is too strong for such interference it is felt.
